Dear Friends,

The Church of England recently published the results of a study of church growth in their denomination. I found it very challenging reading, and many of the points apply equally well in the Church of Scotland. One of the issues highlighted is the shortage of ministers.

"Many churches are not nurturing vocations. The fact that only one third put forward candidates for ordination in the past decade is noteworthy." I would say it's also worrying! I don't know what the equivalent figure is for Scotland, but I guess it would be far smaller. To my knowledge, Abbey & Dirleton have not had a 'home-grown' candidate for ministry for well over a generation.

Recruitment and training for Ministry in the Kirk is at an all-time low. That has a knock-on effect in long vacancies, and people from other congregations having to help them out. There are at least three of our own congregation doing that at in other congregations the moment.

However, one of the saving graces of the situation down south is the way they are utilising lay workers. Many congregations and church groups are led by people who are not ordained, and sometimes have no formal training. Our traditional outlook may gasp at this, but the fact is that it is working! In England, that is. And what of us 'up north'? We need to play catch-up! Schemes like Locally Ordained Ministry are developing, but will have to play a much larger role in church life in the future. And of course they need people who are called to serve. Your minister,

Now that we have Committees covering the different areas of work in the congregation, much of the work goes on inbetween Kirk Session meetings. For example, the Resources Committee are spear-heading the work on the new website, helped by representatives from each committee. We look forward to the website being ready to "go live" in a few weeks' time! It will be updated regularly with new information. At the end of last year, the church was very fortunate to receive legacies from Mrs Goodall and Miss Muir. The Kirk Session will be considering how best to use these funds in the future. The Worship Committee recommended that the Evening Service on 18th May be cancelled to allow people to attend the Heart and Soul afternoon in Princes Street Gardens. The Outreach committee has agreed a new leaflet to be delivered to all the new homes in Gilsland Grange, which is in our parish. The work of Inspire is growing and we noted that the Trust is looking to increase the hours for the youth worker, and possibly add a new assistant to develop music and worship. The Annual Report will be ready for the congregation to read at the beginning of April, with the Annual Meeting planned for 27th April. This Report will show what Abbey has done throughout the year for our members, for the local community and further afield. October will see the 25th anniversary of the linkage of Abbey and Dirleton congregations. A joint working group has been set up to look at how to commemorate this occasion. If you have any ideas to contribute, please let me know! Abbey's Church of Scotland Ministry in Mission contribution for 2014/15 has been calculated as £50,653 which is about £4,000 up on last year. This covers the cost of our Minister and contributes to the costs of Ministers in other churches, as well as Mission projects within the Church of Scotland.

The Kirk Session next meets on $31^{\rm st}$ March with Graham Duffin and the Local Church Review team from Presbytery. Sally Penman

Lent Reflections - What Lent means to me

There is nothing comfortable about lent but, despite that, I love
it. Perhaps because it isn't a fixed date, I find that Shrove
Tuesday sneaks up on me, and suddenly I'm thrust into the
season of reflection and repentance. Just as the Spirit suddenly
led Jesus into the wilderness, I find that lent very quickly reminds me of my inability to provide for myself and my ultimate
reliance on God's graceful providence.

From that starting point, with realignment of internal priorities, lent takes me on a spiritual journey of reflection and discovery. In years past it has been a good time to heal and repair, or to reflect on my place in life, or to discern the first steps on future paths. I am comforted, enlightened and sustained by God during lent, during my prayer, my reading, and especially when I allow myself to explore the silence of my spiritual wild places. Inevitably lent takes us to join Jesus and his disciples for the drama of passover time in Jerusalem. From the triumph of Palm Sunday to the tense and anxious celebration of the last supper, where the disciples, offered bread and wine, are yet to experience the horror and learn the hope of Jesus offering his body and blood.

The Lenten journey is one of preparation: we prepare to journey with Jesus to the cross. We journey to Golgotha not because Jesus needs our help or accompaniment, not because we have anything we can offer, and not because we could ever hope to take his place. We walk that path because, as God-With-Us, Jesus Christ set foot in our world, and it is our calling as the Church to receive and learn of a God determined to be Love for us.
