Forth Road Bridge at 50!

Did you know.....?

In 1130, Pilgrims regularly travelled north to St Andrews to worship at the site of the saint's relics. To assist in their pilgrimage, the church established a regular ferry service to allow speedy passage across the Firth of Forth.

A report dated 15 May, 1811 indicates the volume of traffic using the ferry over the course of the preceding year. In the space of 12 months, more than 83,000 people, almost 6,000 carts and carriages and over 44,000 animals risked a drenching (even death) by taking to the treacherous waters on the boats.

The Firth of Forth is bridged for the first time in 1890, providing an alternative means of travel to the ferries that had traversed the waters for centuries.

'Guid Passage' was the motto given the Forth Road Bridge at its opening in 1964. Today, it provides a safe crossing for more than 24 million vehicles each year.

The Forth Road Bridge is 2.5km in length, and the main span is 1006 metres

39000 tonnes of steel, and 125,000 cubic metres of concrete was used in its construction https://www.forthroadbridge.org/home

Abbey Church - 6 Months to 30th June 2014

General

The deficit for the six months is \pounds 7,412. This is much better than the budget deficit of \pounds 15,615. The annual budget included major maintenance projects.

Income

Open plate collections are below budget and less than the same period in 2013. Gift-aid (blue envelopes) are below budget and less than the same period in 2013. Also included in gift-aid are the monthly standing orders which are slightly ahead of budget. If you are tax payer and wish Abbey to recover the tax paid by you, please would you ask Phil for a gift-aid form.

The premises income relates mainly to hall rental income. This is above budget as the budget was reduced because a major user had stopped using the hall last year. Fortunately actual usage is above that anticipated.

Investment income is above budget as an instalment of interest has been received on the investment with the Church of Scotland.

Expenditure

The positive variance on pastoral expenses is probably due to timing differences. In the six months, maintenance work was much lower than expected. This is reflected in the savings on budget. The painting of Church windows started in August 2014 and further maintenance projects are planned for the latter half of 2014. The miscellaneous expenditure includes the new chairs for the old hall. If you have any questions please ask.
