Another uses Christmas fairies to bring 'magic and sparkle' into the festive season (did you get the clue? But I don't remember fairies in the Christmas story!). A well known pharmacy has a nurse's Christmas (I hope we don't have to buy cold remedies there this winter!).

John Wenham, in his book "The Easter Enigma" suggests that ten of Jesus' twelve disciples were probably teenagers or in their early twenties at most and when you think about it that is highly likely. We know that Peter had a mother-in-law (which requires a certain maturity) and Matthew was a tax-gatherer and therefore an accountant which requires the probity which we all admire in that profession. Think of the other disciples as teenagers: enthusiastic and lethargic, passionate and bored, idealistic and cynical, brave and panicstricken by turns. This is the age-group which in other circumstances join Jihadist armies, dance the night away at raves, drink to excess at university, are passionate about sport, music, argument, independence and love. They are the despair and joy of their parents and grandparents.

The great tragedy is that for three generations the Church has not been able to engage the commitment of this age-group. Before adolescence Sunday Schools have maintained their numbers but it became the norm that once children went to High School numbers declined. There have been exceptions to this general rule but this one cause more than all others explains the present weakness of the Church throughout Britain and Europe. It is interesting to see how Jesus engaged their commitment. His appeal was absolute and direct: "Follow me." He called for self denial, the acceptance of suffering and death if required and endurance to the end

The tragedy is that this same sort of commitment is drawing young men and women to leave the decadent affluence of Britain in order to die as Islamists in the Middle East. The even greater tragedy is that they are deluded

Please pray for our young people at North Berwick High School. Pray that they will know the commitment and passion of following Jesus Christ wholeheartedly. Please pray also for Shiona who is waiting for an operation - that she will have it done by Christmas and be back to full strength. Please thank God for the 30 young people who come to NBHS

Bethany Care Shelter

Bethany Christian Trust will open the Care Shelter this winter from 27 October 2014 to 12 April 2015 to provide a hot meal, overnight accommodation and advice for homeless men and women in Edinburgh.

Last winter there were many nights when over 40 homeless people came to the Care Shelter and similar or more are likely to come in the months ahead.

72 different churches and 849 volunteers were involved last winter. The total direct cost of running the Care Shelter 2014-15 is budgeted to be £143,775 including such costs as project workers salaries, recruitment and training, vehicle costs for transporting rough sleepers to the place of safety, bedding cleaning, laundry and personal survival kits (hats, gloves, scarves, underwear and basic toiletries) for people coming to the shelter between now and next April.

Once again this winter Abbey (with Dirleton) will be providing meals for homeless people at the Bethany Care Shelter on five nights in various churches in Edinburgh.

The first is just before Christmas in Abbeyhill Baptist Church and a catering team is already in place for this.



Donations of **NEW** warm socks, hats, gloves, scarves and underwear (handed into the Church Office please before 20 December) would be very much appreciated.

Abbey is catering at four other venues and there will be a meeting in the new year for those wishing to help and to get things organised. Dates and venues:

Comments – Abbey Church - 9 Months to 30th September 2014 General

The deficit for the six months is £4,187. This is much better than the budget deficit of £14,606. The annual budget included major maintenance projects and the purchase of investments.

Income

Open plate donations – these are below budget and less than the same period in 2013.

Gift-aid donations - these are weekly envelope donations (blue envelopes) They are below budget and less than the same period in 2013.

Also included in gift-aid donations are the monthly standing orders which are slightly ahead of budget. Note - If you are tax payer and wish the Abbey to recover some of the tax paid by yourself please would you pick up a gift-aid form from Joyce in the office or ask Phil for one.

Premises income - this relates mainly to hall rental income. This is above budget as the 2014 budget was reduced as a major user had stopped using the hall last year. Fortunately actual usage is above that anticipated.

Investment income – this is above budget as an instalment of interest has been received on the investments with the Church of Scotland.

Expenditure

Pastoral expenses - the positive variance is probably due to timing differences.

Premises costs - In the nine months maintenance work was much lower than expected. This is reflected in the savings on budget. Some of the painting of Church windows was carried in August and this work was completed in October This should bring the premises costs more in line with budget. Additionally winter fuel bills will be much higher. *Miscellaneous expenditure* - this includes the new chairs for the old hall

and the first costs relating to the new curtains in the old hall.



This year, the focus of the stamp appeal is Dorcas, a brand new Refuge House for Women Victims of Domestic Violence and their children in Milotopos, northern Greece run by the Greek Evangelical Church

(GEC). The GEC responded to requests from women seeking refuge from violent partners by buying a house in 2012, which they fully renovated. The house will provide a safe haven for women who have suffered domestic violence and their children.

Scottish Diaspora Tapestry

Many of you may have seen The Great Scottish Tapestry and also the Scottish Diaspora Tapestry, both recently displayed in and around Edinburgh.



I visited the Diaspora tapestry when it was shown in St. Mary's Cathedral and my eye was drawn to a panel depicting

the work of Mary Scott in Gantok, Sikkim. As you may know, St Andrew Blackadder Church is twinned with the church in Gantok, in the same way that Dirleton Kirk and Abbey Church are twinned with Kalimpong.

This made me think that maybe we should be doing something about a panel about the Scottish influence in and around Kalimpong. I contacted the organisers (based at Cockenzie House) who were keen on the idea as long as we could complete the project by March 2015.

After discussion with Miku Foning, and gaining the agreement of the folks in Kalimpong, I have set the ball in motion, giving the artist at Cockenzie House a number of images from which he is going to sketch an appropriate design. Once all this is done, and we are happy with the result, they will issue us with the canvas and all the coloured wools we will need to complete the tapestry.

So.....watch this space for progress reports.....and of course the finished article will be shown in both churches before we return it to be displayed as part of the Scottish Diaspora Story. *Doreen Guy*
