Report on the National Youth Assembly

The National Youth Assembly (NYA) is a residential weekend for young people aged 18-25 who have some connection with the Church of Scotland. This usually means either members or regular attendees of the CofS, but young people from other denominations are often invited as special guests; this year we welcomed delegates from the United Reformed Church in England, the Scottish Episcopal Church and also the Free Church of Scotland.

The NYA aims to give young people a say on the direction the CofS is taking, and the state of Christianity in Scotland as a whole. Over the weekend, we discuss and debate on a few chosen topics, and a report is written which is then presented to the *General Assembly (GA)* in May. The report is written by a team including our Moderator, Clerk and 18 Youth Representatives, half of whom accompany the Moderator and Clerk to the GA. The team partakes fully in the procedures of the GA, and the stories that circulate about the week give it an almost legendary status!

It is really difficult to describe how much I get out of the NYA. I have now been 4 times, and I enjoy it more each year. One of the best things for me is the fellowship with other young Christians, especially coming from a small town where we are few and far between! I have met so many people from all across Scotland, and from many different backgrounds, whom I can call friends. It is so encouraging to meet other people with whom you can share experiences of being a young Christian, and it really is inspiring to hear about what goes on in other Churches across the Country.

This may sound all a bit corny to you, and it still does to me sometimes, but I cannot overstate how much the NYA has helped me in my faith. I am so grateful that David told me about it 3 years ago - many young Christians I speak to elsewhere have never even heard of it. If there is one easy thing I can do, it's to spread the word about the NYA, what it does, and why more young Christians should go!

This year, we stayed at Gartmore House near Stirling, which many of you will know. Our topics for discussion were Gender Injustice in Scotland and the World, mental health and the future of ministry in the Church. This last issue was, for me, the most interesting and engaging. We had input from Speakers from the Ministries Council and others, after which the floor was opened to

delegates to make points and respond to others. It was fascinating - I could have sat and listened for hours. To hear other young people like me make such insightful arguments and suggestions has given me hope that the future of Christianity in Scotland is bright.

I have to thank all of you in Abbey Church for supporting me and enabling me to have this experience.

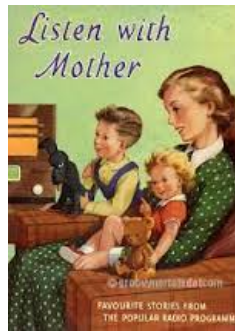

I look forward to seeing you on Thursday, 13th October at 12 noon.

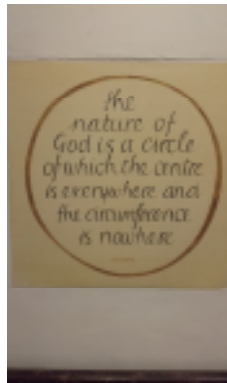
