Dear Friends,
Rick Warren started a local Church by going door to door for 12 weeks and asking people these five questions:



What do you think is the greatest need in this area? (This question got people talking to him.)

Do you attend a church? If they said yes, he thanked them and moved on. Notice that he didn't ask, "Are you a member?" Many people who haven't been inside a church for years still claim membership somewhere.

Why do you think most people don't attend church? This was less offensive than asking "Why don't you attend church?" to which people might say it's none of your business! But when he asked why they thought other people didn't attend, they usually gave their personal reasons.

If you were to look for a church to attend, what kind of things would you look for? The answers made him realise that most churches offer things that many people are not interested in.

What could I do for you? In the Gospels, Jesus often began with a person's needs, and Warren says this is the most basic question the church must ask.

These questions were the seeds of what was to grow into one of the biggest congregations in the world. And it all started with a few simple and non-threatening questions.

In the church, we often ask why people are not coming to us. Warren asked what the church could do for them. And the results were amazing.

In our recent services on the book of Acts we've seen the first Christians go out with good news to others. Can I encourage you to read the whole of Acts - it won't take long - and see how they did it? We might learn some valuable lessons for today.

SINGING NEW SONGS

In Psalm 96, the psalmist encourages us to "sing to the Lord a new song" and that is exactly what we have been doing in Abbey Church in recent months. During the month of February, the choir introduced, as its introit, a hymn written in 2004 by Nick Fawcett called "Lord, today your voice is calling". Over successive Sundays we introduced additional verses until on the last Sunday of the month, the congregation joined in with the by then quite familiar tune, written by Susie Hare.

In March, using the same approach, we introduced "Glory be to God the Father", with words and music written by Patrick Appleford in 2007. Appleford is better known for a hymn we sing regularly, "Lord, Jesus Christ", composed over 50 years ago.

During the month of May, we introduced "God of life, we come in worship" the words of which have again been written by Nick Fawcett (1997). The tune to which this song has been set is "Blaenwern" which is very familiar and used for "Love, divine, all loves excelling".

Nick Fawcett is a former Baptist minister and now concentrates on writing, despite suffering from myeloma. His aim is to "write material free of religious jargon that reaches out to people of all faiths and none". I think he has achieved his goal with this hymn.

A total of £4,981 was raised for the recent Missionary Gift day.

"County of Sanctuary"

Dozens of people from towns and villages across East Lothian attended a meeting organised jointly by David Bradwell, co-ordinator for Scottish Faiths Action for Refugees and the "East Lothian Welcomes Refugees" group on May 5, in Haddington.

The aim was to see how churches in all denominations, local groups and individuals might offer support to Syrian families now living in this area under UK Government/Council plans.

In a presentation, he asked the audience what they felt should happen "five years from now" (which I personally thought was too long) and someone proposed a shorter timescale — one or two years. Others emphasised how ready East Lothian had always been to offer support to people in need. One proposal was for 'sanctuary breaks' - where Syrian families now living in Edinburgh or Musselburgh, for example, could be hosted to enjoy what most of us take for granted here in our comparatively well off area. People expressed commitment and compassion for the refugee families, in many ways.

A Council official who works closely with the Syrian arrivals and two 'early' refugees who provide a 24/7 phone help line for newcomers, described their work supporting school age children and adults and the meeting approved David's suggestion that a handy title for an East Lothian approach could be "**County of Sanctuary**". He will now consider the suggestions made and has offered to follow up by emailing those interested.

David Bradwell lives in East Lothian and previously was Secretary of the Churches Refugee Network; Scottish Churches Refugee Network; Scottish Churches Parliamentary Officer and Associate Secretary of the Church of Scotland's Church and Society Council. He is a member of the Methodist Church and sits on the British Methodist-Catholic Dialogue Commission.

The "City of Sanctuary" movement originated in Sheffield in 2005 with people organising community meetings and businesses, organisations and groups supporting incoming refugees to offer "a positive vision of hospitality within local areas".
