Dear Abbey & Dirleton Friends

Our Kirk Sessions were recently given a presentation from the Presbytery Forward Planning group about the new Presbytery Plan. This is still work in progress but ought to be finalised later this year.

The plan is being revised because of the drastic reduction in the number of ministers over the next few years. We are not recruiting enough, we're not keeping enough, and we're losing a lot, many because of retirement. In the next 5 years there will only be 2/3 of the Ministers needed to fill charge, and Lothian Presbytery will have to reduce its ministers by 1/3.

But the church of Jesus Christ is not about Ministers! It's about people, and about building the kingdom. Jesus promised 'I will build my church . . .'. We are building the church. For example, our weekly

We are building the church. For example, our weekly 'little nippers' and monthly youth club groups are drawing in young people and parents. Our Sunday Club is an enthusiastic group of children & teenagers. And in Abbey we've just completed work to extend and upgrade our halls, providing better space for the very young as well as older people and groups (this building work is thanks to the generosity of the late Dorothy & Hugh Robinson, who were faithful members of Abbey).

We're in the season of Easter, the time of resurrection to new life. I didn't finish the quote from Jesus: 'I will build my church, and even death will not overcome it'.

<u>Year of Young People</u> <u>May Theme - Participation and Influence</u>

I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full. John 10:10

Suzi Farrant (Mission & Discipleship Council Children & Young People's Development Worker):

'The God I believe in is a God of abundance not of deficit. A God with whom there is always more, a God of hope, a God who desires to see us grow and have life in all its fullness. When we recognise all that God has done and is doing for us we begin to join in, following the Spirits leading, willingly sharing such abundance with others, regardless of age.

Starting from a place of abundance helps us to notice the stories of children who have found love within our church communities, the stories of young people being released from pain and given hope, the stories of adults whose faith has been inspired by the questions and thoughts of children.

Hearing these stories leads us to yearn for more and to being more willing to change what we are doing so that we are in step with the Spirit, leading others to join the party too.'

Action

Give young people the chance to influence decisions that affect their lives

How are young people involved in decisions in the church? How can this be developed?

How can young people be more involved in the Kirk Session?

Ask children and young people what they want to do in the groups they attend.

How are young people involved in decisions at Presbytery and national level - can they attend National Youth Assembly or become a General Assembly Youth Rep?

Can young people share a video of something they are proud of or some challenges they want to share with the wider church?

To further develop your relationship with your children and young people, find out if any young people or children participate in the decision-making within their school. Are they members of the Pupil Council? Eco Committee? Or any equivalent? Celebrate these achievements with your young people.

REGAL

Our last sessional meeting was held in March. We sat enchanted as we listened to Stan da Prato telling us about the challenges he faces when he prepares and makes his pallet gardens. During his talk he showed some photographs of the pallet garden in the process of being created. The gardeners, amongst the audience, picked up many useful tips on how to improve their own gardens

Once completed, the pallet garden is entered into Scottish gardening competitions and Stan's garden usually wins a gold medal. Then the pallet garden is transported to Abbey church where it enhances the entrance to the church for the next few months.

Sunday 4th March may have been the first day in the recent freeze when a thaw was noticed in the air; when the fine powdery snow which had fallen in the previous week, its texture so unusual in Dirleton, took on the far more familiar quality of slush; but we thought it better not to risk convening for worship in the Kirk, but to gather instead in the Hall. The gravel on the paths between the gate and the doors of the Kirk make them difficult to sweep. So, with thanks to those responsible for sweeping the shorter paved path from the road to the door of the hall, we met in the hall instead of in the Kirk.

The Church of Scotland, like every other organisation in the country, had circulated warnings calling for caution in the conditions: a matter of 'Is your Service of Worship really necessary?' rather than 'Is your Journey really necessary'. We concluded that it was: but in the light of the decision not to meet in the Kirk, we stood down the organist, Philip Boon, from his duties. There being no keyboard in the Hall, we faced the challenge of singing hymns unaccompanied.

David told us about arriving to take a service in a church in the Highlands when a student, and being advised- there and then- that the practice there was for unaccompanied singing. "Who leads the singing?" was his question, and back came the answer: "You". That unnerving experience stood him in good stead; gathered together, in the comparatively confined space of the hall, we contrived to make a reasonable

sound, and no-one held back out of embarrassment about their quavery high notes or inability to sound the deep notes.

I was reminded again of the words of the great composer and musician William Byrd, written in the 16th Century: "since singing is so good a thing, I wish all men would learn to sing". We missed our organ accompaniment, but there was something in the experience of singing unaccompanied that made me wish we could do it more often.

A last flurry of thick snow fell towards the end of our worship, but the snow was beginning to disappear, and things were starting their return to normal (except for those who had to use the train service to Edinburgh that week...). The experience of singing unaccompanied, without an organ, made us think of different aspects of our worship, and reflect on the pleasure to be taken- on occasion- from singing hymns in that way. The experience of the snows, and how people responded- the greater concern for neighbours, the offers to make journeys to the shops, the sharing, the collective efforts to clear roads and pavements- these things prompted me to wonder if it would be a good thing if the so-called 'Beast from the East' were to return for a few days every year, to remind us of the way in which we are called on to show the same love for our neighbours as we show for ourselves.

Comments - Abbey Church (All Funds) - Year to 31 December 2017

General

The surplus for the year was £13,130 including the receipt of £26,121 in legacies and expenditure on the Seminar Room of £18,086.

Income

Offerings - These are ahead of budget and ahead of the amount received last year. Included in the offerings line is regular gift days, these are shown in the figure of £69,998.

(Note - If you are tax payer and wish the Abbey to recover the tax paid by yourself please would you pick up a gift-aid form from the office or ask Phil for one.)

Miscellaneous income includes an unexpected donation of £4,000 for Nimbong and £1,600 from lunch time pop-up music.

Premises income is £5,032 ahead of budget reflecting the increased use of our halls.

Expenditure

Church Office expenses include substantial photocopier repair costs. A decision has been made about a replacement photocopier. In the first quarter of 2018 a photocopier was taken lease.

The new building project is proceeding and £18,086 has been spent on professional fees and the foundations of the building.

Miscellaneous costs include an amount of £4,000 sent to Kalimpong to help the Nimbong project.
