

Dear Friends,

We have recently completed the Presbytery's *Local Church Review*, which is a bit like a health-check for congregations. The format is much more user-friendly and mission-oriented than it once was. It's intended to highlight pointers for action by a congregation over the next 5 years.

Although in some ways Dirleton and Abbey are very different congregations, the LCR reports for each of them (which went to Presbytery at the end of June) highlight similar issues. While there is much to commend, it's no surprise that, in common with most congregations in the Kirk, we face the challenges of an ageing community. The central place of prayer was also emphasized, as was the need for a mission strategy and the need to be relevant for all generations.

We have already started to address these issues: Bible Study and prayer materials have been distributed, and a prayer time started before the Abbey Morning service. The Sunday morning Summer Holiday Club is a welcome development, and will form the basis of our children's work afterwards. The service and preaching plan for the year covers Bible and Christian Education, with House Group materials, and personal devotion. The report recognizes that change may be painful, and that lamenting the past and hoping it will come back again is no solution to the challenges of today. I recently visited churches outwith our area, and sometimes I felt that I had stepped back 50 years or more. That may be fine for those of us who are in the over 50s (I include myself!), but not for the under-30s. If you have any thoughts on this, please do speak to me. Your minister,





REGAL - Summer Outing Thursday, 12 June was the date of Regal's summer outing to the National Museum of Flight at East Fortune, and we were blessed with a wonderfully warm and sunny morning. John Guy is a member of Regal and also of the Aircraft Preservation Society and, as he has a very comprehensive knowledge of all the aircraft kept on the airfield, he was an excellent guide for our group. He led us to the best hangars and, once inside, he was able to give us a running commentary of the various aircraft. Our first stop was in the hangar holding the British Airway's Concorde - G-BOAA. Many of us were surprised at the lack of luxury in Concorde which has seats more akin to economy class seats rather than luxurious ones. However, as was explained to us, there was no need for luxury when you departed from Heathrow at 10.30 am and arrived in New York at 9.25am! After this we saw a short film showing the history of East Fortune airfield during World Wars I and II. It was interesting to learn that East Fortune became an airfield prior to the creation of the RAF. In 1915 it was established as an airship airfield and in 1919 the British airship R34 flew from East Fortune across the Atlantic to New York and then made the first ever return flight. A walk across the airfield brought us to the hangar holding many different war planes ranging from the faithful WWII Spitfire to the more modern Harrier jump jet used in the Falklands' war . Finally we went to the Preservation Society workshop where the volunteers are in the process of constructing a WWI Sopwith LCT  $1\frac{1}{2}$  Strutter plane that had an important influence on the design of many subsequent aircraft. John is taking an active part in the creation of this plane and he was able to point out his valuable contributions. After this most interesting and enjoyable tour, we adjourned to the Glen Golf Club for a delicious lunch. Our trip was made especially interesting as we had our own personal guide, John Guy, and we all owe John a very big vote of thanks - thank you John.

#### **BLOSSOMING – FLOWERING – FLOURISHING**

Gardens and fields in spring and early summer this year are very lush, an appropriate backdrop to my flying visit in April to Uganda for the celebrations of Bishop Kivengere Girls' School, Muvebe, 40<sup>th</sup> (Ruby) Anniversary. The Chief Guest at our Foundation Day on 28<sup>th</sup> April was the Prime Minister of Uganda. The seeds of girls' secondary education planted during the oppressive regime of President Amin have grown and flourished. The School which began with only 40 girls in Senior One now has 400+ students doing courses up to "A" Level in all the Government curriculum subjects. plus some practical courses, with a well-qualified teaching staff. I went with a friend from Oban who represented the Scottish Episcopal Church. It was her first visit to Uganda and a great pleasure for me to show her something of the history and geography. We met many Alumnae of the School who welcomed us warmly. The events in Kampala and at the School were all well-planned and brought glory to God. It was surely His protection and provision which brought our small school safely through a regime of extreme Moslem persecution of the Church. Our Archbishop, Janani Luwum, was martyred by Amin himself in February 1977 and I clearly remember being in the local church with the girls on the day when the news broke, and then sharing fellowship in our School. The words of Philippians 1 v. 21, "To me to live is Christ and to die is gain", sank into our hearts. Perhaps it was the deep bonds forged in those years which have produced the abundant fruit of the Gospel today in the lives of mature Christian women in professional and family life today, in Uganda and beyond. It was a great joy to meet many of them again. During the 40 years 1974-2014 approximately 4,000 girls have been educated at our School. We look to the future with the Water Project in progress, likely to be completed this month, a growing Fund for a new Hall, an Internet Link about to be made, a revived Alumnae Association and a flourishing partnership with The Abbey **School, Reading.** We are very grateful to all our friends and supporters in this ongoing work, but above all we worship and give thanks to our God and Father for His gift of salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, "the same yesterday, today and forever." Heb. 13.8 Please continue to hold us in your thoughts and prayers in this turbulent world. Elizabeth Traill



#### This Winter's Work

Bethany Christian Trust

Bethany Care Shelter Manager, Cameron Black, reflects -

Looking back at the work we have accomplished this winter, I am amazed at the dedication of the volunteers who make this work possible. Over 700 people from 73 churches gave of their time and skills to make this vital service happen throughout the winter. What struck me most was the sense of unity and love demonstrated each night. The team is united by a desire to serve sacrificially, and to demonstrate love to those who would otherwise be sleeping rough. This winter we witnessed an increase in the number of people coming to the Care Shelter. On one particular night, 59 people turned to us for food and a warm place to sleep, one of our highest numbers. On average 39 people used the service each night. We are alarmed to see this increase, but we are also grateful that with your support we are able to meet people at their greatest time of need.

## Very often it is a crisis that brings people to the Care Shelter. A good example of this is Micky's story.

Micky is an artist who found himself homeless as a result of violence at home. Having nowhere to turn he sought help from the Care Shelter. As our relationship strengthened, Micky opened up and we were able to encourage him to start planning for the future. Micky started looking for work and he now uses his creative skills to design T-shirts for a local business. He has also recently moved into his own accommodation. Last week Micky came to express his gratitude and said that the worst time of his life had led him to one of the best experiences of his life. One of transformation and hope. #### Comments - Abbey Church, 3 Months to 31 March 2014

#### General

The main point to note about the first quarter accounts is the receipt of the second instalment of Mrs Muir's legacy. These amounts were then invested into the Church of Scotland Growth Fund. As our accounts are based on a receipts and payments basis this investment shows as "expenditure". As these actions were anticipated a deficit budget was set to allow for this investment. The budget also included an allowance for major repairs. As a result of this cost not yet being incurred in the first quarter of 2014 this quarter shows a much smaller deficit than anticipated.

#### Income

More people have signed gift-aid certificates this has led to greater tax recoveries than expected in the budget. If you would like a gift-aid certificate please ask Phil. The premises income relates mainly to hall rental income. This is above budget as the budget was reduced because a major user was no longer using the hall. Negotiations are proceeding and a new major user may use the halls.

#### Expenditure

The positive variance on pastoral expenses is probably due to timing differences. Most of the premises expenditure was on budget; however maintenance work was much lower than expected. A major maintenance project is currently being organised, this project relates to the Church windows.
