I came across a local headline recently which made me do a double-take: 'Abbey Church is finally sold. After lying empty for decades, it

finally went under the hammer for £32,000. Built in the 1850s, it has remained empty since it was closed. Proposals put forward include turning the building into an arts centre, shop or housing'. The building in question is in Dunbar! but it reminded me of our recent Local Church Review. Based on extensive work in the Church of England, we learned that a church with no children is one which is on the road to closure.

I wonder how many children and young people there are in Abbey who are in full-time education? It may surprise you to learn the answer is almost 40, and that's not counting the grand-children of our 300 members. Where are they?

Our Sunday Club team put in a lot of time & effort to provide something for kids on a Sunday. Sometimes we're dismayed by the poor response. We will continue to organise this until at least this summer, when we hope to run a Holiday Club on Sunday mornings in July, as we did last year. After that, I can't promise what will happen.

This is an issue for all of us, to offer any support and encouragement to them. We can't just leave it to others.

North Berwick has been looking for a venue for an arts centre for some time. It would be a great asset to the town. But maybe you don't want that to be the future of our church building? That may depend on each of us.

<u>Rosslyn Chapel</u>

Rosslyn Chapel was founded in the mid-15th century and originally had six ordained canons and two boy choristers. The purpose of the chapel was to celebrate the passing of the day with prayer and also to celebrate Holy Mass for the faithful who had departed.

Since the late 1980s the chapel has also featured in speculative theories concerning the Freemasons, the Knights Templar and the Holy Grail.

Rosslyn Chapel was prominently featured in the 2003 bestseller, The Da Vinci Code and thereafter in the film adaptation.

Regal has been very fortunate as we have managed to arrange a private tour of the chapel with a guide on Thursday, 11 June 2015 commencing at 11.00 am; however, we must have a minimum of 12 people in our party. All ladies and gentlemen in Abbey Church are welcome to join the tour. After the tour we will have a light lunch (soup and sandwiches/paninis) in the Rosslyn cafe. The concessionary entrance fee is £7.
