Dear Friends,

I've been reading the latest report on the state of Christianity in Scotland. It's sobering stuff. Church attendance and Bible reading are at an all-time low. Many people's perception of Christianity are quite negative.

The report is called 'Transforming Scotland'. I wonder how we can do that?

In a recent article, James Emery White asks, "What six things could a church do that would bring about renewal and growth?" Here is his list:

1. **Simplify your structures** - give decisions into the hands of those with responsibility, ie let leaders lead.
2. **Use young people.** You attract who you see, and most churches are growing old.
3. **Become more contemporary** in music and graphics, decor, topics, website and signs. It's 2015!
4. **Stop preaching,** and start communicating. There's a difference.
5. **Shift the outreach focus** from the already convinced to those who are not. Don't preach to the converted; it's called the Great Commission.
6. **Prioritize your children's ministry** with money, staff, space and resources. Children's ministry is your most important ministry for outreach and growth.

Why don't churches act on these items? White offers this sad but accurate conclusion: They don't want to change. Change is an essential for a dynamic, growing church, and it starts with people who are willing to be change agents.

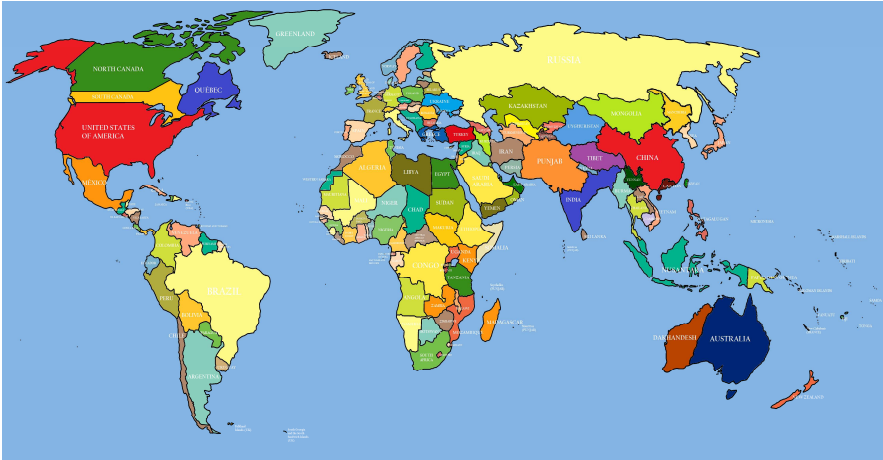

Thoughts from Peter Kimber

For the past 18 months I have been an absentee from Dirleton, working as the Locum Minister for the three parishes of Yester, Saltoun and Humbie. If all goes well a permanent appointment will be made soon, so I have been reflecting on one aspect of the work: funerals.

At the first funeral I took, the daughter of the deceased asked, "Where is my father now?" One answer was to say, "He is upstairs waiting for the undertaker," but he wasn't. His body was there but the father she knew and loved was not. The physical systems of his body had stopped working but the essential person was not there. It struck me that when I drive my car home, I turn off the engine: it stops, but I never ask where the car has gone. The engine has stopped but the car is still there. But when a person's "engine" has stopped we naturally say "where have they gone?" The real person is not there though the body remains.

Atheism is a fairly recent belief system which assumes that the physical, material world is all there is. For an atheist, that young woman's question had no meaning: cars and human bodies are just machines. For most of us that is absurd. For Hindus, beyond death lies re-incarnation; for Muslims there is some kind of punishment or reward beyond the grave; for the Animist the spirits of the ancestors are all around the living.

But why believe in life after death? At the simplest level we cry out for justice because human justice in this life is so inadequate and incomplete? As ten million people died in gas chambers a terrible cry for justice must have gone up every day while that crime continued. Was the death of Hitler and his colleagues an adequate response? Was that what they deserved? If the deaths of Hitler and Mother Teresa end in mere nothingness it violates our natural desire for justice, and indeed it makes the whole of life meaningless. The Old Testament answer was "Shall not the judge of all the earth do right?" St Paul's answer was that "we shall all stand before the judgment seat of Christ."

Super Sunday Club

On Sunday 25th October (which happens to be Bible Sunday) all the children of the Super Sunday Club are to be presented with a Bible in Church. The Bible in question is a super duper one and one that will appeal to children of all ages. It takes the form of daily readings with exciting titles such as - Frogs, frogs, frogs; A gobbling snake; Rahab hides spies; Scary Goliath; Trees Walking and many more. The Bible is full of pictures and the children (with parents encouragement) will be asked to read at least one story each week in preparation for the next Super Sunday Club.

We are continuing to use the Scripture Union material and this includes story appropriate games and activities. Our Young Leaders, Holly and Mia, are doing a sterling job in organising games and some craft items. The children are also learning the Lord's prayer off by heart. Between now and Christmas, we will be making some beautiful Christmas baubles to decorate the Church as well as rehearsing for the Nativity service on 20th December. We are all looking forward to having the children from Dirleton Sunday School joining us for a party before Christmas.

Please keep on praying for more families and children to join us.
