

Dirleton Kirk Session Clerk's Notes

Remembrance Day

We marked the one hundredth anniversary of the Armistice in the First World War on a fine, clear autumn morning. The Minister took the service in the Kirk, and showed the children and the adults at the front a New Testament, carried by a soldier in his breast pocket, which stopped a bullet and saved the wearer's life. We could see where part of the projectile had continued moving, tearing through the pages, leaving the soldier wounded, but living. In the sixth chapter of his letter to the Christians in Ephesus (modern day Efes, in Turkey) Paul tells us to put on the whole armour of God, including the breastplate of righteousness: he is speaking figuratively, speaking of spiritual armour to defend ourselves from an assault on our spirit, here is an example of the Word of God of-fering physical protection. The life of one soldier saved by the New Testament given to him by the Bible Society (all soldiers were given Bibles as well)- but all the millions of soldiers, sailors, and flyers who served were given the only means by which all the turmoil and slaughter of that war, and all wars since, might be comprehended in full.

Around the War Memorial, Bob Kane led us in remembrance of those who died in the two world wars, reminding us that many more have died since, not withstanding our annual prayers. And in the (comparative) quiet of the green, the names carved into the stonenames familiar from their annual reading, but also, as Bob pointed out, names still familiar around Dirleton and the area- were their own stark poetry.

Wreaths were laid, and Holly Walkingshaw and Iona

Stewart helped lay one, and bowed their heads, representing the coming generation.

Our thanks to Bob for leading us at the 'Eleventh Hour'; he was also up for six in the morning, with others, to attend the War Memorial, as people were do-

ing throughout the country.

Thanks also to all those who wore their medals- another reminder of the conflict and sacrifice which has continued during the last century and beyond into this.



Flower Team

The topic of Remembrance offers a good opportunity for me to recognise the wonderful and thoughtful work of our Flower Team. We are lucky enough to have a Kirk which never fails to impress those who visit- not only on Sundays but throughout the week; and the beauty of our flowers augments the beauty of the building, the stained glass, the art, and the setting. Marking Remembrance, at the front of the church, by the lectern, the Flower Team created a display which was simultaneously poignant, beautiful, and uplifting: at its base dead leaves and twigs, beautiful in themselves but lifeless, with dead bark above, then, on its side, a steel helmet surrounded by poppies, from the midst of which rose a Cross. Rising over death, the assistance to survivors and their families as symbolised by the poppy; with the Cross, the ultimate symbol of hope, rising over all.

Radio 3 offered a concert of music by Messiaen. In the charts, Cher was number 1 with 'Believe'. And at 7 pm, our Minister David was inducted to the charge of Dirleton Kirk linked with Abbey Church, North Berwick. Since then we have enjoyed twenty years of thoughtful and innovative ministry, sermon's moving easily from pithy practical example to theological heights and back again; pastoral care, encouragement, and friendship. To mark this anniversary and express our thanks, there will be a card available in the Kirk during all the services in December, on which we can write our congratulations to David- and our thanks to Mary and Lucy for their support and forbearance.

Comments - Abbey Church (All Funds) - Nine months to 30 September 2018

General

The deficit for nine months was £78,266, this mainly relates to the expenditure on the Large Hall/Seminar Room of £88,059. This was financed by the drawing down of bank accounts deposited in past years.

Income

Offerings - These are less than budget but ahead of the amount received last year. The amount received in the bank by standing order continues to increase however the 'blue envelope' and the open plate giving continue to decline.

(Note - If you are tax payer and wish the Abbey to recover the tax paid by yourself please would you pick up a gift-aid form from the office or ask Phil for one.) Last year miscellaneous income included £4,000 anonymous donation for Kalimpong.

Expenditure

Pastoral costs include expenditure relating to youth work. This has increased with the recruitment of the new staff.

Other salaries are over budget due to the recruitment of the family and youth worker.

Premises costs are below budget. Even allowing for the purchase and installation of the radiators in the New Hall. A planned maintenance programme should mean that premises costs may increase.

The new building project has been completed at a cost of £88,059. This amount covers both the seminar room and the refit of the Large Hall.

We joined St Andrew Blackadder Guild for the first of the Project speakers, on November 6th to hear Dr Pam Cairns tell us of the Seema Project in Pune, India who's aim is to build a home for forty children who are the abandoned offspring of trafficked sex workers and to provide funds to meet the initial running costs of the home. The Project also aims to rescue commercial sex workers who have been trafficked and who would like to start a new life free from exploitation and sexual violence. The speaker had been on the first Vine Trust boat taking medical help to the people of the Amazon river in Peru. There she had a life changing experience. Now she devotes her time to projects partnered by the Free to Live Trust.


We ask for peace Lord, in every corner of the world.
