Half Hour Prayer Service Dirleton Dear Dirleton & Abbey Friends,

This weekend, the General Assembly opens in the Assembly Hall, Edinburgh, and when you get your newsletter, it will be over. I'm not a Commissioner this year, and I confess I haven't read all the reports yet. To be more eco-friendly, printed copies of the reports are no longer sent to every Minister, and many of those attending use electronic media to access them, thus saving on paper.

That's just one example of the ways the church is keeping up with the times. It has a sophisticated IT system, and the Assembly, like the Guild Conference, is live-streamed so that anyone can 'be there'. These innovations are not just gimmicks. If the gospel is to be shared (and what is the point of church if not its mission?), it must be done in ways which will reach the widest audience, and speak to them in ways they will understand.

The early Christians did the same. Paul's letters were a new form of writing, and what we know as a 'book' (codex) replaced the old scrolls because they were easier to read and transport. Innovations. And for one reason: to take the good news to the ends of the earth. In Paul's day that also involved a lot of travelling; now we can do it by the click of a button.

Let's do it!

Your Minister, David In May and June, we look at different aspects of prayer in our morning services. On Sunday 30th June we have a joint service in Abbey for **Sea Sunday**, when we'll be joined by members of local maritime organisations.

Looking ahead, on Sunday 11th August we'll have our (now annual) evening **Gospel Choir Service** for Fringe by the Sea.

Walking Together - Reflective Walks for All Ages

Walking Together was the theme of the 2018-19 Moderator, the Very Rev Susan Brown, and General Assembly has been encouraging churches to get involved in different types of pilgrimage.

What opportunities might there be to walk with a group from your church? Can you create a time to walk, talk and pray? Reflective walks can be a meaningful way for people to connect with God, creation and each other. They can be done alone or in a group, with church regulars or those with no church connection, in a rural or urban setting.

Walking Together cards have been produced to encour-

age conversation and reflection with people of different generations. These have proved very popular and have already been used by Boys and Girls Brigade groups, Guild groups and



church groups of different ages. The cards focus on a theme such as a view, a stone, food or water, and provide walkers with prompts for something to think about, something to do and something to talk about.

REGAL - Sumer Outing

Comments – Abbey Church (All Funds) Year to 31 December 2018

The Abbey's Annual Report, including the 2018 Accounts, was presented to the congregation at the Annual Stated Meeting on the 24^{th} March. Shown below is a further analysis of the out-turn for the 2018 year.

General

The deficit for the year was £81,216, this mainly relates to the expenditure on the Large Hall/Seminar Room of £88,059. These costs were financed by the drawing down of funds deposited in past years.

Income

Offerings - These are less than budget but ahead of the amount received last year. The amount received in the bank by standing order continues to increase however the 'blue envelope' and the open plate giving continue to decline. The budget assumed some income to Kalimpong, there was none in 2019.

(Note - If you are tax payer and wish the Abbey to recover the tax paid by yourself please would you pick up a gift-aid form from the office or ask Phil for one.)

Miscellaneous income includes income from the Gospel Choir. The budget was set before the Gospel Choir was set up.

Expenditure

Pastoral costs include expenditure relating to youth work. This has increased with the recruitment of the new staff.

Other salaries are over budget due to the recruitment of the family and youth worker. Premises costs are below budget. Even allowing for the purchase and installation of the radiators in the New Hall

Church Office expenses are above budget due to the leasing of a new photocopier.

The new building project has been completed at a cost of £88,059. This amount covers both the seminar room and the refit of the Large Hall. Over the four years of this project has cost £108,820, this includes the installation of new boilers.

Miscellaneous expenses include the costs of the Gospel Choir.

The Easter Code

Just before Easter, a team of ten ventured in to meet the primary 5 pupils at Law Primary. This was a follow up lesson to the Christmas "Bubblegum n' Fluff" lesson and our aim was to share the real message of Easter for Christians, getting beyond the chickens and bunnies!



Most of the hour and a half lesson was spent sharing the story of Jesus' life from Palm Sunday to his crucifixion. We started with a drama account of Palm Sunday before moving round story stations to hear about the last supper, Judas' betrayal of Jesus, Jesus' trial, then his crucifixion. We used props to tell the Bible accounts and they collected pictures in their workbooks to help them remember. We then came back together to consider the evidence for the resurrection, ably guided by The Nutty Professor.



Our final activity was to design some crosses with scratch art - as you scratch the design into the black cardboard cross, the bright colours below shine through. As Christians, the glory of Jesus' resurrection gives us joy and hope, despite the darkness of Good Friday. The children engaged well with the activities and it was a fun, if tiring, day with a morning and an afternoon session. A huge thank you to the team who were brilliant with the children.
