Dear Friends,

Two of the most important things which a church can provide are worship and pastoral care.

With that in mind, there will soon be some opportunities for local training in looking after people's spiritual needs, and also in taking part in or leading worship. On two Monday evenings in the Autumn, we're fortunate to have the services of Jacqui Linsday to lead us in some training in pastoral Care. She is a qualified counsellor, and the Pastoral Assistant at Morningside Parish Church.

The dates are Monday 25th September, and Monday 9th October, both starting at 6.30pm. To help plan the evenings, anyone wishing to attend will be expected to come to both nights, and to have booked a place (numbers are limited). If you'd like to come, please let the Minister or the Office know. There will also be an email about it nearer the time, to which you can reply, but it will be 'first come, first served'.

Regarding worship, the minister is preparing some informal afternoon meetings for anyone who is already involved, or would like to be, in leading worship. This might range from doing the reading in church, leading the prayers, speaking at a Care Home service, or conducting a full church service. Dates and details will follow.

We believe in the 'priesthood of all believers', in other words that we all have a part to play in Christ's church. Let's pray that we can motivate and mobilise each other in that.

Worship, and pastoral care. 'But what about mission?' I hear you say! Yes, that is also vital. 'The Church exists by mission as a fire exists by burning'. But I believe that if we are a worshipping congregation ('in Spirit and in truth'), and a caring family ('who is my neighbour?'), then our mission will quite naturally emerge from that.

The World Church Committee is badly in need of some fresh input and momentum. Would you PLEASE consider joining our committee?

The committee meets perhaps three times a year and over the last few years we have raised awareness and small sums for initiatives such as Christian Aid, Eco church (through our awareness raising Cherished Clothing initiative), The Sophie Hayes Foundation(anti human trafficking and slavery) and The Teapot Trust (providing Art Therapy for children with life limiting medical conditions). In reality the work of the World Church committee is just a small fraction of Abbey and Dirleton churches response to world need. Our congregations have also enhanced communications with our twinning partners in Kalimpong, raised contributions for the Foodbank, participated annually in the Blythswood shoebox appeal and the Harvest appeal, and supported Rotary fundraising for crises in Ukraine, Syria and Türkiye amongst others.

With climate change and political and economic instabilities, there is surely plenty of opportunity for us to be finding ways of helping people in need both home and abroad.

We would love to have you join us.

We are fortunate that it has been possible to welcome visitors from all over the world into our churches seven days a week during the summer months and it is heartening to read the messages and comments which many of them leave in our visitors' books. So often the comment is along the lines that people are pleasantly surprised to find churches with an open door. Others mention words like "peace," "calm" and "serenity" to describe our places of worship. Sadly, throughout our land, too many church doors are being closed, never to open again for either worship or for visitors. Long may Abbey and Dirleton continue to welcome visitors, both to our services of worship and at other times.


Speaking of visitors, it was good to welcome back Jeanette Wilson on one Sunday recently (with her Mum, Moira) and to hear about what she has been doing over the year since her placement with our congregations. It is encouraging to see (relatively) young people like Jeanette on their journey to full-time ministry and we give her our blessings for the next stage of her preparation which will be at Livingston Old Church (a place where Rev David Torrance ministered early in his career).

As we have been enjoying some good sunshine in recent weeks, our thoughts turn to our Harvest Festival on the weekend of 30 September/1 October when we will give God thanks for the harvest (which we pray will have benefitted from the sunshine and showers). This year, our harvest offerings will be directed towards the work of the charity Mary's Meals in Zambia. Although too many families suffer from food poverty in this country, the situation in many other countries, like Zambia, is even worse and the knock-on effect on children and their health and education can be devastating. Mary's Meals tell us that it costs them only £19.15 to feed a child for every day of the school year and we trust that through the generosity of our congregations we will be able to help them feed a large number of children in the year ahead. Cardboard collection boxes for loose change will be available in church from end-August and donations by cheque and in notes would also be very welcome. It is hoped that we might be able to welcome a speaker from Mary's Meals at our morning services on 1 October. All will be very welcome at the Harvest Supper in the Abbey Church hall on the evening of Saturday 30 September 2023. Details will be provided in the intimations nearer the time.

A visitor to a joint meeting of the Abbey and Dirleton Kirk Sessions meeting on 26 June commented that the most valuable time of any church service is the 10minutes immediately after the worship service concludes. His meaning was simply that if visitors come to church and leave without anyone having spoken to them, they might be unlikely to return. Members of our Kirk Sessions recognise that our two congregations have always been seen as welcoming, whether before or after services, at the coffee time or when meeting people outside of church activities. This goes a long way to explaining why both churches have recently seen an increase in the number of people who return regularly after their first visit-and we pray that no visitor will ever leave our churches with the feeling that their presence was not appreciated by others who came to church for the same purpose- to worship God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit in the fellowship of other believers.

The Abbey Young People's Worker, Hazel Gray, left us at the end of June to focus her time on other work and commitments. Hazel has been part of our staff team since 2018. We appreciate all of the work which she has carried out on our behalf and wish her well in all that she does in the future. The Abbey Kirk Session has agreed that we should recruit someone else to develop our work with young people and families and the recruitment process is expected to start in the near future.

Our thanks to all involved in carrying out the annual inspection of the fabric of the Kirk and its buildings. There are some who appear to consider that the need to maintain beautiful and historic buildings, to preserve serene interior spaces as places of worship and contemplation, are in a sense distractions from the active role of the church in the contemporary world. Of course it is easy to ponder the cost of upkeep of buildings such as ours, and consider what might be done with the money by way of alleviating poverty, or caring for the sick- activities central to, and in the forefront of, the mission of God's church in the world. But these are not the only tasks of the church, serving as it does a Kingdom which is not of this world. Jesus told a rich young man that he should, in order to get eternal life, as well as obeying the commandments, sell his possessions and give to the poor. But He also reproached those of his disciples who were indignant at the woman who anointed Him at Bethany with a very expensive perfume, which, they said, might have been turned instead into money, and that money given to the poor. The woman's action is seen as prefiguring Jesus' imminent death on the cross: but it was in itself a

beautiful action, beyond criticism.

The time, energy, and money laid out on our church

buildings might be dedicated instead to the charitable

purposes of treating poverty and disease: these are aspects of the church's mission, but not the whole of that mission. When we are in church, during formal worship or at other times, we can find beauty, peace, uplift; we can be challenged by the embodiment of the faith



shown by others, to be found in stone, in stained glass and carved wood, in music, in continuity- to strive all the harder for the accomplishment of our mission, in whatever ways we can make a difference.

We were all saddened to hear of the death of John Gray, a faithful elder of Dirleton Kirk for many years. Just as we have missed him from among us during his illness, so we will continue to miss his kindly and good humoured presence. Everyone will have their own fond memories of John, of his jokes, of service to the Kirk Session, of the many acts of kindness which he performed so frequently. We send our love and prayers to Denise and to all the Gray family.
