The Kirk Session has acknowledged, with gratitude, the work of Dr John Guy, who

has skilfully created the new noticeboard which is now situated in the grounds at the front of the church. The previous noticeboard, which had served us well over many years, had fallen victim to stormy weather some time ago and it is so good once again to have something in our grounds which promotes what we do as a church family. Those passing the church in mid-July may have noticed the powerful display in the new noticeboard which links the recent hole in our harbour wall (the result of another

storm) and its repair with qualities of the Christian church. The artwork was created by Colin Ley, an elder on the Kirk Session, and Colin plans to follow this display with others from time to time.

Our Little Nippers group usually only meets during school term time. However, this year, following requests from a number of the parents, it continued for an additional three weeks into July. We are grateful to the leaders of the group, Karen and Iain Murray, for being willing to hold these additional meetings.

Still on the subject of the church grounds, we appreciate the ongoing work carried out by volunteers of North Berwick in Bloom who do so much to make our grounds an attractive spot in the town. We are so fortunate to have this team of hard workers in North Berwick who help to make the place so beautiful and attractive.





Thanks are also due to the church volunteers who open and close our doors during the summer months. Comments in the visitors' book (from people whose home can be in many different countries) demonstrate how valuable an open church is to them.

As I write this in mid-July, we still seem to be waiting for summer to arrive. The odd days of sunshine are welcome, but they seem to be outnumbered by cloudy and rainy days. It has sometimes been so cold that we have had to turn the church heating back on. While there is still time for us to enjoy consistently good weather, our thoughts are turning already to the season of harvest when we have the opportunity to give thanks for the harvest, which we hope will have been safely gathered in by the time of our Harvest Thanksgiving service on Sunday 29 September 2024. This year, as you will read in a separate article in this Newsletter, we will be making our harvest offerings to support the work of Ripple Effect in Kenya.

The harvest service will be preceded by our Harvest Supper in the Abbey Hall on Saturday 28 September. Details of that event will appear in the Newsletter nearer the time.

We pray for all of our family who will have the opportunity to go on holiday in the coming weeks and also pray that many visitors to the town will be encouraged to attend one of our services or to visit the sanctuary for a time of reflection and prayer.

Abbey Church Posters

The restoration of North Berwick's harbour wall following last year's storm damage was the inspiration behind a new poster presentation which is displayed in front of the church. The two poster images, shown under the headings RUIN and REPAIR, depict the original damage to the wall and its subsequent rebuilding. In our version, however, the words on the bricks used to restore the wall reflect values we stand for as a church, such as love, joy, peace and patience. In addition, just as North Berwick needs a solid wall to protect its harbour, so we need a solid wall of spiritual and moral values to protect us. The two posters also carry the following words:

RUIN

A fierce Autumn tide Ravaged the harbour wall Smashed a gap 5 metres wide When ancient stones began to fall

REPAIR

If your life needs repair Like the old harbour wall Heed the words on these bricks And treasure them all

Pineapples Matter More Than You Think

Do you like pineapples? You can have them fresh, tinned, dried or juiced, or maybe even on your pizza! How about poverty-busting pineapples? It's a genuine question and one which is of great importance to Kenyan farmer, Fatuma, her husband Omar and their two young children.

They live in Kwale county on the coast of Kenya and, like many other local families, are going hungry as the global climate crisis worsens,

bringing long periods of drought and reasonable heavy rainfall to their region.



Fatuma and her family are living on the front line of the climate crisis where crops are often destroyed due to erratic weather conditions. Serious damage to crops in Kenya is causing a loss of income for many families and a lack of nutritious food for people to eat.

Fatuma worries a lot about providing her family with a healthy, balanced diet, every time her crops are carried away by the heavy rains.

As a church family here in Dirleton and North Berwick we are planning to do as much as possible to help make life better for Fatuma and her family, alongside many others in Kenya. During our harvest service on Sunday 29 September 2024 a special collection will be taken to support the charity Ripple Effect, previously known as Send-a-Cow. The charity works with farmers such as Fatuma, teaching them how to grow climate-resilient fruit and vegetables, including poverty-busting pineapples. Collection envelopes will be available in church from the beginning of September.

Ripple Effect provides training in sustainable farming

skills to help Kenyan farmers cope better with the effects of the climate crisis, improve the quality of their land and develop



alternative income streams so they can become increasingly resilient to future episodes of flooding and drought.

Our Harvest donations could help families living in rural Africa to break their cycle of poverty. Through our support for Ripple Effect, we can help more crisis-hit families start their own kitchen gardens, plant poverty -busting pineapples, and begin to grow enough to eat.

Dirleton Kirk Session

David Kirkpatrick

After many years' service, David Kirkpatrick has stepped back from the post of Treasurer to the Dir-leton Kirk Session. At the meeting of the Kirk Session on 12th June, his resignation was accepted and a vote of thanks for his service was proposed and carried. David brought to the post of Treasurer all the experience of a career in insurance and financial services. He shouldered the burden of working with the Church of Scotland's rules and its IT system to bring the maximum benefit to our financial position. His patience and good humour withstood those challenges, to the very point of his standing down from office. He always presented his financial reports to KS in accessible and comprehensible terms, and answered all our queries and questions with patience and friendliness. On be-half of the whole congregation, I thank David once again for his selfless service- and on behalf of the whole congregation, I welcome Ian Lennock into the post of Treasurer, as David's successor. It is heartening that members are willing to give freely of their time and experience in the service of the Kirk Session.

Safeguarding training

Thanks are also due to those who gave up a Saturday morning on 8^{th} June to undertake "Safeguarding" training- another example of sacrifice, for the better running of the church and its mission. We are familiar with the ways in which vulnerable people can be

abused, by those who are charged in whatever capacity with responsibility for their care and nurture: perhaps we are more familiar with this than we were in the past. People who would abuse others- for financial gain, or for sexual gratification- are drawn to places where they can bring themselves into contact with the vulnerable. Naturally, churches and faith communities are prominent among such places. It is the case that churches and church members have been defrauded, and the vulnerable in our communities have been abused- because they are places where the vulnerable are to be found.

Safeguarding training is intended to alert us to the risks to vulnerable people, and how to protect them from harm, and ourselves from the consequences of the criminal activities of others. I found a lot of interest in the ground covered in our discussions.

Among many other topics, we discussed the response which should be made where an individual wishes to start coming to church- and that individual has a criminal record which would give rise to concern for the safety or well-being of others in the congregation. We have to protect ourselves and our members- but how is that consistent with the teachings of the Gospel, where such weight is laid on the idea of repentance from sins, and their forgiveness?

My experience with the criminal justice system has given me close experience of the power of the Gospel to effect change for the better in people, change going to the very root of their character- how would this sit alongside behaviour towards someone which would even tend to suggest suspicion, or even a cautious welcome? It was good to learn of the consideration which the Church of Scotland has given to the matter, and the useful, practical approaches which they have put forward for use by congregagtions.

It was also good to sit in a busy hall with others, from churches all over Presbytery, a reminder of the scale and reach of the Kirk in our society. Our thanks are due to those who led the work over the morning, and to our friends at Chalmers Memorial Church, Cockenzie, for hosting us.

Church fabric

Those who have joined us for worship over the past couple of weeks, or who have dropped in on the Kirk at other times, will have seen that the main door is taped off, and notices directing that access is to be by way of the door at the Archerfield Aisle. This is a precau-

tionary measure after stones were discovered at the base of the tower, by the main door, which might have come from the fabric of the tower itself. Whilst we consider the matter, and as a precautionary measure only, we shall not be using the main door of the Kirk as an entrance and exit at Sunday worship. Access for Sunday worship will be by means of the Archerfield Aisle, which is of course the door by



which the Kirk is entered at other times, when it is open to visitors and for private prayer and reflection.

Abbey Church (All Funds) Six Months to 30th June 2024

General

Payments exceeded receipts by £6,902. This is better than budget.

Income

Offering support means was slightly less than budget. This has a consequential effect on Gift-aid recoveries. (Note - If you are a tax payer and wish the Abbey to recover the tax paid by yourself please would you ask for a gift-aid form by phoning the office or ask Phil for one. Alternatively, both the gift-aid and the standing order form are available from the Abbey Church website).

Expenditure

Church of Scotland payments are less than budget due to the budget being overstated.

The savings on premises costs reflect the problems we have had with our energy supplier. After months of discussion/complaint we appear to be reaching a satisfactory conclusion. Hopefully the effect of this will be seen over the next few months.


