

Blythswood Shoebox Appeal 2023

This year we collected 124 filled boxes, together with an extra \pm 195 in lieu of a box from Abbey and Dirleton Churches and also from people not connected to either Church.

The driver of the lorry who came to collect the boxes is also involved in delivering and distributing them abroad. Already he had been to Moldova with their supply, together with the gifts for Ukraine. He was not allowed to enter war-torn Ukraine but the boxes were collected by Ukrainian transport. The driver was off to Serbia the following week. The Organisation seems to run like clockwork and provides so much joy to those in desperate need.

A huge thank you to all who provided empty boxes, the group who covered them with Christmas paper, and the wonderful people who filled the boxes. A special mention to Paola who sometimes had her office turned upside down, and who helped in so many ways.

Abbey Kirk Session Robert Burgon



Our Harvest Thanksgiving service on 1 October 2023 provided members of the congregation with the opportunity to hear about the work of Mary's Meals, the Argyll-based charity which provides meals for children in a number of developing countries where the shortage of nutritious food can have an impact on both the



health and education of children. We also had the opportunity to provide donations to support the work of Mary's Meals in Zambia. The amazing amount of £2,051 was contributed in Abbey (with the Dir-

leton congregation making a separate donation). Our donations, together with Gift Aid of almost £300, will enable Mary's Meals to feed more than 100 Zambian children every day for an entire school year. We give thanks for the work of organisations like this and pray that the time will come when all children, everywhere, have enough food to sustain them.

Just three weeks after the Harvest service, the congregation's generosity was once again evident with the large collection of shoeboxes which will be distributed to families in Eastern Europe by Blythswood Care. Remembrance Sunday is always a time for reflection on the losses experienced by so many families in two World Wars and many conflicts since then. This year, the service seemed all the more poignant given the daily loss of life we are seeing in conflicts in the Middle East and Ukraine. The sanctuary was beautifully decorated with the wellknown symbol of remembrance, poppies. In David's sermon he reminded us that in the 20th century there were more lives lost in conflict than in all of the previous centuries combined. That is

hard to fathom and what we are witnessing in the first half of the twenty-first century does not suggest that we are any closer to seeing swords being transformed into ploughshares. Let us continue to pray for peacemakers and peacekeepers.

A front-page in the Scotsman recently had the headline "Worshippers stay away as 700 churches face clo-sure". The article was followed by two whole pages on the same story, mostly focussing on the likely outcome of the current Church of Scotland Mission Planning process. While we understand the concerns of those whose communities are to be affected by church closures over the next few years, we recognise that the reasons behind these closures are not just a shortage of ministers, but also declining attendances and inadequate income. We give thanks that there are no plans to close Abbey Church and Dirleton Kirk (in spite of some of the "fake news" and rumours which circulate in the area). We also give thanks for every person who worships in our church and for those who have joined our worshipping community in recent years. We also give thanks for the generosity of our congregation which enables us to carry out the work which we are called to do.

At recent meeting of the Kirk Session, we have been considering the possibility of adding some new elders to the Session. A number of people have been approached and are considering this possibility further. We hope to be able to induct some new elders in the near future.

The Kirk Session will meet again on 4 December and one of the items on the agenda will be a review of our Vision Statement for the 2020s.

In the coming season of Advent, we look forward to a full programme of services and a bible study series (in conjunction with members of St Baldred's Episcopal Church).



Dirleton Kirk

There was a rumour that the Kirk Session had applied for Planning Permission to convert the church into flats. This came about when a notice to the effect that Planning Permission had been applied for appeared on the main gates. The answer is much more mundane. A



number of years ago pieces of mortar and small bits of stone fell off the tower, landing near the west entrance door. A local firm of builders came along with a cherry picker and removed all the loose masonry and mortar to make it safe, but it was clear more extensive work was going to be required. Architects recommended by the Church of Scotland were consulted, and they thought it possible that Historic Scotland might award a grant to help with the cost of the work. However, it would be a condition of any grant that all other work considered necessary by Historic Scotland would have to be carried out at the same time. Because the Church is a Grade A Listed Building, such works can only be carried out after Planning Permission has been granted, and it is a condition of applying for a grant that Planning Permission has been applied for. So there's the answer. Planning Permission has been applied for to allow the repairs to be carried out, and a grant application will be submitted shortly. But whether or not the full list of repairs as opposed to only strictly necessary repairs will be undertaken will depend to a large extent on funding and what grants are available.

Remembrance



We marked Remembrance Sunday in Dirleton around the War Memorial. Much of it had the solemnity and sanctity which comes with following a pattern hallowed by time: the laying of the wreaths and the two minutes' silence; every now and again leaves, in ones and twos, falling slowly, poignantly through the cold, still air to the ground. The rehearsal of the names of the fallen, and the silent reflections on what their lives would have been like, before they were cut short; what the parish would have been like on the last occasion on which they saw it, before they made their sacrifice. There were aspects too which are more and more familiar as the years pass. The consciousness of traffic noise in the distance; the walkers passing on the other side of the green, evidently without feeling the need to pause, to acknowledge, to recognise what was going on; perhaps telling themselves that they would observe Remembrance 'in their own way' later- or perhaps hav-ing concluded that observance of silence on the Eleventh, or the purchase of a poppy, marked remembrance sufficiently.

We can reflect that those men whose names are inscribed on the War Memorial were sacrificed so that we should have liberty; and the essence of liberty is that we enjoy the freedom to order our lives as we see fit, to set our own priorities, to live as our consciences dictate. For your tomorrow, we gave our today. Bob Kane as always led the observance in a manner which blended due solemnity with contemporary relevance- and with a voice trained to carry instruction across a parade ground! My thanks to all who participated.



Blythswood Appeal

We observed another, newer tradition in October and November- participation in the shoebox appeal organized by the charity Blythswood Care. As we are poised to begin another winter, the news speaks of continuing war in Ukraine, and across swathes of Africa, and elsewhere in the world. The cold air which nipped us around the War Memorial in Dirleton anticipates the colder air of winter, and reminds us that for many around the world, winter is a time which brings home the reality of material poverty. Blythswood's initiative confronts the realities like old people with insufficient warm clothes, or women and girls without access to sanitary products.

I like to think there is more to it than the meeting of material needs, and I base that view on what I have read in Blythswood's magazines, and in the films which David has shown us down the years from the charity, showing the response of recipients to receiving their shoeboxes. The uniqueness of Blythswood is that charity takes the form of a gift. It is more than a donation of money into a central fund, to be dispersed among the needy. It involves the giver in thinking about the recipient: "I think this hat looks nice", "he would like to have these gloves", "these are my favourite sweets". We will never know the individuals who receive the individual gifts which we give, following the general instructions which Blythswood gives about what should be included in the shoeboxes, but we know that we are giving a present to an individual, not contributing to a fund. That emphasises the fact that the recipients are our brothers and sisters, children of the one God, as we all are, and that cannot but cause us to reflect on the way

in which we lead the rest of our lives. Every present given at Christmas marks the gifts of the Magi to the infant Jesus; and also the gift that we all received at the first Christmas, the gift of Hope.



Everyone involved in the shoebox appeal receives that gift again, tokens of our common humanity, and the common delight in giving, and in receiving.

On behalf of the Kirk Session of Dirleton, I look forward to seeing you over Advent and Christmas, and in the year ahead of us.



Abbey Church and Dirleton Kirk Christmas Charity

The helpers each week prepare the snack for the children which is a nice way to bring the children together at the tables and cups of tea and coffee and biscuits are available for the adults.

It is lovely to see and hear the children having fun and all new babies and toddlers will be warmly welcomed.

WALT - Women Are Learning Together First Monday in the month 2:00pm in Abbey small hall.


WALT continues to look at the theme "Come Dine With Jesus". We have investigated open air picnics with the Feeding of the 4000 and 5000, home cooked meals with tax collectors Zacchaeus and Matthew, a wedding banquet, and a great feast.

At the parable of the Wedding Banquet in Matthew

22:1-14 we thought about what Jesus was teaching the people at that time and what he continues to tell us today. In the parable the King represents God, the son represents Christ, the servants represent the disciples, the first in-

vited guests represent the Jews and the other guests (sinners) represent the Gentiles.

If you have time, why don't you remind yourself of this story? We had a big discussion about the man who didn't wear the right wedding clothes. At first sight what happens to this man seems unfair and cruel but when we delved into this, we found that in the first century, guests would be given a robe or cloak to wear by the host or groom before entering the wedding banquet. So, this man was disrespectful by choosing not to wear



the robe and he represents all those who have not truly believed in Christ and carried out his work. This challenged us as we asked ourselves the question "Do we wear the right clothes to represent Christ today?" In Paul's letter to the Philippians, he lists some of the ways in which you look as if you are clothed like a guest at the wedding banquet of the king. Some of these include: - gentleness, kindness, patience, self-control, truth, and mercy to name but a few. A challenge indeed!

On Monday 4th December, we will look at the final meal, Jesus ate with his disciples in the upper room. There will be no meeting on Monday, 1st of January. On Monday, 5th of February we will complete our series with Jesus appearing at the meal at the end of the Emmaus road and the breakfast on the beach.


