As mentioned elsewhere in this Newsletter, sincere thanks are extended to Karen and Iain Murray for their tireless leadership of our Little Nippers group for more than two years. We wish them a good retirement and look forward to appointing a new Coordinator to take over leadership of this group in the New Year.

Thanks are also due to Bel Hardie, who has stepped back from her role in leading our annual shoebox appeal for Blysthwood, something which she has done for several years. This year's appeal saw even more shoeboxes being donated by Abbey members and friends of the congregation (along with a financial contribution towards their distribution costs).

As we approach the season of Advent and Christmas, we look forward to a number of special services. We have had an annual service remembering loved ones in early December and invitations are extended to families who have experienced a bereavement in the previous year or two. This years' service will take place on Sunday 1 December 2024 at 6.00pm and all are welcome.

This Christmas we will have two joint services with the Dirleton Kirk congregation. On Sunday 22 December 2024 the service will take place in Abbey at 10.30am and the following Sunday, 29 December 2024, we will meet in Dirleton Kirk, also at 10.30am.

Each year, we select two charities, one home-based and one overseas, as recipients of our offerings at the special Christmas services on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day (as well as the proceeds of the giant Christmas card which has once again been produced by Milne Brodie). This year's home charity will be Fresh Start- an Edinburgh charity which helps those who have been homeless and are moving into their own accommodation with essential equipment and

other practical support. This charity recently made a moving presentation at a meeting of TAG. In recogni-



tion of the tragic events which continue in the Middle East, it has been decided that the overseas charity this year will be World Vision through the DEC Middle East Humanitarian Appeal.

The next meeting of the Abbey Kirk Session will take place on Monday 3 February 2025.

We have been given consent by the General Trustees to put in an application for grant funding in order to fund repairs to the church tower. Gordon Symon, our fabric convenor, has worked very hard in liaising with the General Trustees in order to arrive at a position where we can take this important step towards carrying out these works.

The main door of the church was closed for a couple of weeks in September after it was feared that parts of the fabric had worked loose and fallen in the vicinity of the door. Investigations demonstrated that this was not the case, but it was a useful reminder of the desirability of maintaining the condition of the tower. If any more confirmation of that might be needed, we might look at the persisting difficulties with access to Dirleton Castle.

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Lily and Alba fashioned a scarecrow for the Kirk, as part of the Dirleton Scarecrow trail, in October. Having made a straw Minister, and last year a straw Angel, this year it was a straw Good Shepherd, along with a straw lamb. Thanks to Margaret McPhail for helping to co-ordinate efforts, purchasing materials, and guiding young hands with scissors, glue and felt. And thanks too to the others who could not resist assisting with stuffing straw into bags in the hall after worship. Some splendid skills were displayed, such as Prof. Keith Cornwell's mastery of the use of duck tape. "How else do you think we keep vintage cars held together?",

observed Keith, as he gave the straw Shepherd form and solidity.

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After many years of faithful service, Jim Dickson has taken the décision to step back from playing the organ at Sunday worship on a regular basis. Jim has made a great sacrifice to play for us, in terms of time travelling to and from home on Sundays and during the week, when he would attend to prepare music for us. He has also been invaluable in overseeing work to maintain, repair, and even to augment, the organ in the Kirk. As recently as October, he learned of the availability of 'stops', for which space is available on the fabric of our organ, from another instrument at Craigmillar Parish Church; and as a result of this we will be able to fit a Viola De Gamba (which sounds like an oboe) and a Ce-

leste (which gives a string sound). It would be sad to think that these will be fitted after Jim had ceased altogether to play for us on Sun-days: but happily Jim will continue to play at Dirleton, though on an occa-

sional basis.



We have all enjoyed Jim's skill as an organist, exploring all the effects which the instrument can produce, varying subtly and perceptively the tone of his playing to reflect the words of different verses of hymns of praise. After the dedication of offerings on Sunday, our practice is to have a period of prayer and

reflection, accompanied by music from the organ. The Minister has often spoken for all of us in his appreciation for the thoughtful and skilful tapestry which Jim has woven out of threads of musical influences arising out of the themes of our worship, our readings from Scripture on the day, from the seasons themselves. Jim has never flinched in the face of a challenge, such as the efforts which he made to present a challenging piece of contemporary organ music, played at the Coronation, in a manner pleasing to Dirleton ears! Perhaps the clearest demonstration of our appreciation for Jim has been shown after the close of our worship, when he has played music as a 'recessional' for us leaving the church- when the Minister, on his way to Abbey, has

frequently identified the music being performed ("He's playing Bach...") and regretted greatly having to leave-and in fact no-one in the congregation would ever leave, until Jim had brought the piece which he had selected, practiced and performed, to its close. I would tell him that he would have to perform a second recessional, because nobody left during the first!

We shall all miss Jim's company in our continuing fellowship on Sundays in the church hall, and his conversation on music and indeed any other topic of conversation. We do not so much wish him the best for the future, but rather look forward to our next meeting: and in that regard, I am delighted to be able to report that Jim is to play the organ on Sunday 29th December, at the joint service to be held at Dirleton at 10.30 am. Psalm 150, verse 4: Praise him with the timbrel and dance: praise him with stringed instruments and organs.

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In Princes Street in Edinburgh this week, to catch a 'bus, and noticing the installation of the 'Christmas' market- a fortnight before the commencement of Advent- I felt a bit querulous. And now I have to conclude this newsletter note, written in mid-November, with best wishes for Christmas! It feels very premature! But the familiar quickenings and excitements are starting to be felt, and so keep an eye on the Intimations for news of Christmas services. And thanks very much in advance to the Wemyss and March estate, for supplying our Christmas tree, and to Tracy Walkingshaw, who organizes this, and with Neil puts the tree up and decorates it, and thus does so much to let us feel that anticipation build in us as we approach one of the great feasts of the Christian year. A Happy Christmas, then, from me, but in the first instance a Happy Advent, in the course of which period of waiting and preparation I look forward to seeing you.

Warm greetings from the Diocese of Eastern Himalaya, Church of North India!!

Trust this finds you both in the best of Health!! And both of you back home abit settled after your visits to Africa.

I thought of sharing this email sometime back, I did send a whatsap message to Carol with a few tit bit points. I suddenly realised that we had started our Twinning Programme with Lothian Presbytery, Church of Scotland, now Lothian & Borders Presbytery in the year 2000. Next year it's going to be

the Silver Jubilee of our Twinning Progarmme.

As we take this twinning journey; and heading to celebrate 25 years, and the wonderful experience we have had with our friends in Scotland; I thought of sharing some of my wild ideas, if we could take our Twinning Programme to the next level with such activities to make it a little bit more interesting and exciting!!

1. Silver Jubilee Celebrations of our Twinning Programme:

From my side some ideas as food for thought!!

- (i) Publish a 25 yrs. Silver Jubilee Twinning Souvenir
- (ii) Update & sign our Twinning Agreement for next 5 // 25 yrs.!!
- (iii) The two of you, though Bill is coming this coming November; along with the current Moderator, COS could visit us next year to sign the Agreement here in our Diocese.
- (iv) A group from our Diocese could also visit the Presbytery & some friends from the Presbytery could visit us.
- (v) Can we start some scholarship prog. for underprivileged, tribal & deserving meritorious students for education & skill development??

Maybe, Bill could motivate friends at the Presbytery & Carol, with friends in partner organisations & Church of Scotland could also pool in resources!!

2. **Support for Theological Studies**: We have youth in our Diocese who would like to undertake theological studies and become Presbyters and work in our Diocese. If provisions for

scholarship could be explored.

- 3. Exchange of church congregation members from the Diocese & from the Presbytery annually: If possible, to start from this year itself. If you could inform us the number we could send annually to Scotland, and also those coming from the Presbytery, we could plan accordingly to start identifying suitable people to be sent from our Diocese.
- **4. Youth Exchange programme:** For the youth in both our Diocese & Presbytery to know more about our locations and culture; a special initiative should be made for annual exchange visit to both sides. This will create better goodwill and understanding among the youth and to know more about the wonderful mission work of the people more than a century ago by Scottish missionaries and the Diocese still nurturing those mission works.
- 5. **Twinning of schools:** We have 12 (twelve) schools in our Diocese and 8(eight) SUMI, Girls Higher Secondary School & Dr. Graham's Homes, in Kalimpong. Turnbull Higher Secondary School and Nepali Girls' Secondary School in Darjeeling, Scot Mission Girls School in Kurseong, Mahakalguri Mission Boys High School & Mahakalguri Girls High School in Eastern Duars, all established by the Scottish missionaries. Some of them have celebrated their centenary. And SUMI & Kalimpong Girls Higher Secondary School have already celebrated their 125 years.

Next year, 2025, Dr. Graham's Homes will be celebrating their 125th. Anniversary. Hence, twinning of schools will involve the younger generation to continue this wonderful legacy of contact and goodwill between Church of Scotland, The Presbytery of Lothian & Borders and our Diocese of Eastern Himalaya and Church of North India.

- 6. Exposure visits for sustainable livelihood activities: Our rural farming communities and even some livelihood activities in our semi urban & urban towns; Since a major part of our Diocese are rural villages; it would be wonderful and interesting if our farming communities and even other profession could be given exposures visits to Scotland. Such exposure visits will create positive signals and energise the target group people to work with more enthusiasm. Kindly explore this issue of concern.
- 7. **Exposure visit for Teacher:** Can we have exposure teaching visits for the teachers?? It will break their monotonous teaching life and they can get energized in their teaching careers. Earlier, gap teachers used to come to Dr. Graham's homes and Scottish Universities Mission Institution (SUMI), Kalimpong from Scotland half a century back. During my visit to Scotland maybe in 2011or was it 2019? We did talk about such a programme/!!?? Can we initiate this in right earnest??
- 8. A befitting Project to mark the Silver Jubilee of our Twinning Programme: Can we do a nice project befitting 25 yrs. of our Twinning Programme?? I have been motivating friends, in

our Diocese and likeminded friends in our Diocese and in Scotland for the dire need of establishing a College. Especially with 12(twelve) schools in our Diocese besides other Board examination schools. Bill, Carol and Robin Hamilton, I have been talking about this project for a while!! Robin has also done some scouting!!

You all, have any better ideas!!

Would appreciate your feedback & valuable suggestions as we are on the threshold of celebrating our Twinning Programme Silver Jubilee Celebrations!

Bill, if you could also please share with all the twinned churches in the Presbytery regarding the above issues and get some positive response it will be great!!

Comments – Abbey Church (All Funds) Nine Months to 30th September 2024

General

Payments exceeded receipts by £16,319. The budget being £14,136.

Income

Offering support was less than budget. This has a consequential effect on Gift-aid recoveries.

Premises income is well below budget, hopefully this will improve in the last quarter of the year.

In September we received £2,000 legacy from the estate of David Murdoch Reid. In October we received £20,000 from the estate of Ann Tollan Morrison, this will show in the next quarter's accounts.

During the year Dirleton reviewed the monthly amount they were paying for joint costs and increased this amount from £500 to £600 per month.

(Note - If you are a tax payer and wish the Abbey to recover the tax paid by yourself please would you ask for a gift-aid form by phoning the office or ask Phil for one. Alternatively, both the gift-aid and the standing order form are available from the Abbey Church website).

Expenditure

Church of Scotland payments are less than budget due to the budget being overstated.

The savings on premises costs reflect the problems we have had with our energy supplier. The effect of this will be seen over the next few months. Additionally some maintenance works are outstanding at both the Church and the Manse. Miscellaneous contains the cost of the new projector, and screen, being £9,444.

The Edinburgh-based Christian charity, Bethany Christian Trust, has once again launched its "Buy a Bed" campaign to assist those sleeping rough on the freezing cold streets of our capital city.

For 30 weeks from 2 October 2024, the Bethany Rapid Re-accommodation Welcome Centre will provide those in need with individual en-suite rooms, three meals a day and 24-hour specialist support to enable them to move on to more suitable housing.

In the period from October 2023 to May 2024:

- -787 individuals stayed in the Centre;
- -89% of those who stayed said they'd otherwise be staying rough;
- -24,500+ meals were provided;
- -99% of known outcomes were positive:
- -70 people stayed with Bethany on average each day.

Bethany welcome practical and financial support from churches and their members. Street Pastors

Helping a young woman, found unconscious on an Edinburgh street late one night, and a young man discovered in a semi-conscious state, lying among the bins outside a city hotel, are two of the more dramatic incidents encountered by Street Pastors in the Capital in recent weeks.

In both cases the people involved were helped back onto their feet, one via a hospital ward and the other by way of a bit of time and support.

Joining a recent Street Pastors' meeting in Musselburgh to explore the potential for a group of volunteers to be formed in East Lothian was a real eye-opener. The meeting was run by Ben Leathes, Chief Inspector of Police for East Lothian, a committed church member who believes a lot of valuable street work and evangelism can be achieved by the local Police and churches working together, including setting up an East Lothian Street Pastors group.

The Musselburgh meeting drew more than 20 representatives from local churches, including both the Abbey and Dirleton. Presentations were given by Chief Inspector Leathes and Brian Donaldson, Management Group Chair, Edinburgh Street Pastors. There was also an extensive question and answer session.

Brian explained that Edinburgh Street Pastors have been listening, caring and helping on the streets of Scotland's capital since 2009. Starting with support from just four churches and a handful of volunteers, there are now 35 churches engaged in the work and over 55 volunteers. Patrols go out on Friday and Saturday nights carrying tea, coffee, blankets, and bibles.

Volunteers are all Christians and make no excuse for their faith in Christ. They don't go out to preach, however, but to care, help, and listen to those they encounter while on patrol. There are many stories to tell, helping people who have drunk too much or have taken drugs, comforting a suicidal person for an hour or so and signposting where to get professional help, guiding a homeless person to their next meal. There are also countless examples of people wanting to be prayed with or to discuss what life is really all about.

When they'd finished, Brian and Ben were asked if this sort of group was really needed in East Lothian. Absolutely, they said. Maybe not until 4am, as often happens in Edinburgh, but most definitely at key times and during special events across the region.

Brian was also asked if being a Street Pastor is safe. He said he'd seen almost no worrying incidents in all his years on Edinburgh's streets, adding that the most recent Street Pastor to retire had only done so when he reached the age of 84. He also stressed that Street Pastors were fully trained before heading out on a patrol and were always in close contact with the local police officers.

Setting up a Street Pastors group in East Lothian needs operational support from 4 churches, ideally from differing denominations, to set up as a charity. This will need a board of Trustees from the supporting churches along with a management team. The initial costs involved in setting up such a group would be covered by funding from Police Scotland.
