

Dear Friends,

I'm writing this at the start of the General Assembly. I won't be attending, since I'm not a commissioner this time (that joy only comes along every few years). I haven't read all 228 pages of this year's 'blue book' reports yet, but I have skimmed some of them. The impression I get is that these are very challenging times – but we didn't really need a huge tome to tell us that, I think we knew it already.

Looking at some of the numbers (the Assembly seems to love statistics), as a linked charge Dirleton & Abbey are above average in many of the numbers, including our attendance and giving. We're also well above average in the number of baptisms, weddings and funerals; many churches have none or perhaps only one or two in a year. It's a privelege t be able to offer the services of the church to so many people and their families, but it's also a lot of work and pressure on the ministry. Many of these are often also for people who are not in the congregation, but as a parish ministry that's the service we offer, although it can be a difficult balancing act not to neglect the congregation at the same time.

The theme of this year's Assembly is 'Building Together', with a text from 'Thessalonians 5:11' (it should say First Thessalonians!):

'Therefore encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing'

Let us pray that their deliberations will be encouraging, and edifying for us all.



We had an excellent coffee morning at the Church Hall to contribute to Christian Aid week, and thanks are due to those from both congregations who helped set the hall up, ingathered the funds at the door, served the masses, and who baked such tempting delicacies, in such quantity for the hungry and thirsty of the two parishes and beyond. Not since the Sunday School's last edition of *Great Dirleton Bake-off* has such a splendid, waistline-busting spread been assembled in the hall. I wish it might have been possible for me to have sampled everything prepared!

We rendered further assistance to the work of Christian Aid with our special gift offering envelopes at Communion.

Christian Aid is active in 29 countries, in Africa, Asia, South America, the Caribbean, the Middle East- working by responding to emergencies and also on projects to bear fruit in the longer term. It is a movement of people, churches, and local organizations. It helps to train people and equip them with skills in which to prosper, helping the disadvantaged, and spreading prosperity; it fosters development in societies, in material

terms, and in social terms as well; it is informed by scripture and guided by prayer.

At the Kirk Session meeting on 3rd April, we heard of the progress being made to obtain funding for works on the church tower. As I write this, rain is lashing down outside as it has been for much of the past week in what has felt like an unusually cool and wet May- so it is good to reflect on the swift and efficient replacement of the boiler in the Kirk, which has recently been carried out. We also heard at the meeting that, encouragingly, our number is increasing- we are a growing congregation. We will not perish with cold as we await the arrival of summer!

Easter Sunday is always a special day in the church calendar and it was indeed special for Abbey Church this year. We started with what was been the largest ever attendance (around 70) at our 0800am service on Elcho Green (in an unusually sunny and dry morning which was preceded and followed by more of these rainy days which have been a feature of this year so far). This was followed by a happy time of fellowship over breakfast in the large hall. At the 1030am morning service, we had the privilege of sharing in the ordination and admission of our six new elders-Colin and Jackie Ley, Tom and Judy Lockhart-Hunter, Irene Nichol, and Kirsten Swindells. We give thanks for the willingness of these members of our congregation to join the Kirk Session and look forward to working with them as they share the responsibilities of our church.

Those worshipping with us over Lent and subsequently will have been aware of artistic displays which have appeared, initially on the hymn boards and later on the windows around the sanctuary. The first message related to Lent and was followed by one reminding us all of the message of Easter- the risen Lord Jesus Christ. A later display referred to "Thy Kingdom Come," a

global ecumenical prayer movement. Starting on Ascension Day (9 May) and running until Pentecost Sunday (19 May) the campaign encourages prayer during those days and the displays in church included QR codes which visitors could scan with their mobile phones to receive more information and prayer suggestions. We are grateful to one of our new elders, Colin Ley, for arranging these displays and for sharing his artistic talents with us and with all who visit the sanctuary. We also thank the members of the young people of Super Sunday Club who added some illustrations to Colin's Easter artwork.

At a time when so many people all over the world seem

to be suffering, the work of Christian Aid has possibly never been more relevant.

North Berwick has a long



history of providing financial support to this charity by raising funds during the annual Christian Aid Week (this year running from 12-19 May). A small, but extremely enthusiastic group from Abbey and Dirleton churches arranged a number of events to support this work including a Coffee Morning in Dirleton Church Hall and a Quiz Night in the Abbey Hall. With other events including another Coffee Morning arranged by St Andrew Blackadder and a Musical Soiree in St Baldred's Church it is hoped that these combined efforts will have led to a substantial amount being raised. (Details will be provided in a subsequent Newsletter).

I have agreed to participate (as an additional elder from our Presbytery) at this year's General Assembly. Although I have attended part of several General Assemblies (as a trustee and currently Chair of the Church of Scotland Investors Trust), it has been a number of years since I was a Commissioner and after reading the papers (over 200 pages), I attended over the week commencing Saturday 18 May. New Moderator, Rt Rev Dr Shaw Paterson of Strathaven was installed on the first day and followed the theme of "Building Together" during the week. The King's representative this year (the Lord High Commissioner) was the Duke of Edinburgh, Prince Edward and it was good to see him and the Duchess of Edinburgh in that role. The Archbishop of Canterbury joined the royal party on the final day and addressed the Assembly. I pray that the message which comes out of this year's General Assembly, as reported in the press and TV, will be one which demonstrates that our national church is alive and has hope for its future.

Expenditure

The huge budgeted deficit is caused by energy costs. A new energy contract has been negotiated on the Abbey's behalf by the CofS. In line with British energy costs this should be twice the old contract price. There has been a great deal of discussion with CofS and E-on, our new supplier, about the huge increase of costs, hopefully this will be resolved soon and the amount charged to the Abbey reduced!

GOOD NEWS FROM A FAR COUNTRY The 50th Anniversary of the founding of Bishop Kivengere Girls' School Muyebe on 28.04.1974

It is wonderful but humbling to be able to look back over 50 years of girls' education at this small school set on a hill in South-West Uganda and to give thanks to God for His guidance, protection, provision and blessing in so many ways. Our churches in North Berwick, Dirleton and Gullane have played a significant part in the growth and development of the school and I must thank you all for your warm, generous support and for your prayers. The story began in 1974 when I was teaching Geography under CMS at Kigezi High School, Kabale. My home base was in Gullane with my parents who belonged to St Adrian's Scottish Episcopal Church. That big boarding school had 500 boys and only 100 girls and you can imagine the problems we had! The girls were at a disadvantage in class where they were afraid to speak and ask questions. Our Rishon were afraid to speak and ask questions. Our Bishop Festo Kivengere with his wife Merab saw the need throughout the Diocese of Kigezi and had a dream from God of starting a new secondary boarding school for girls. Somehow He led them to ask me to be the founding Headmistress, working with them in setting it up! It was the time of the fearsome dictator Idi Amin and we had only a few buildings on site at Muyebe, nothing else. One of the pastors said to me, "It doesn't matter how many zero's you have, no teachers, no books, no desks, no chairs....Make Jesus your No. 1 and you are millionaires!" In faith that God would provide, we began the task and our church in Gullane took up the project, along with my other link churches and groups in Scotland. I came on leave in autumn 1974 and shared the vision. Back in Uganda we worked day by day, the basics were wonderfully provided and we received more than 450 applications for the 40 places in Senior One, so we conducted interviews. The school actually opened on April 1st 1975 when the first girls arrived. I worked at Muyebe until 1986 when my father had had a severe stroke and I came home to care for my parents. After the death of my dear father, my mother and I moved to North Berwick and joined St Baldred's church and found many new friends in the other church and found many new friends in the other churches and community. Although I had other work and study to do, my heart held a special place for the school. Kind friends from here have joined me in supporting it most generously. In 2000 AD we set up a Trust Fund. In 2001 AD Mrs Margaret Ann Crawford became our Hon. Treasurer and served for 18 years. We are so grateful to her and to Lyle for backing her up. Other friends have served as Trustees. The present Hon. Treasurer is Elaine Hutchison, known to St Andrew Blackadder people. Ten years ago our churches were engaged in the Muyebe Water Project to replace the existing big water tank on school land and to supply piped water to five zones of villages on the hillside. Much gratitude was expressed.



The full story of God's provision over the five decades under six Heads is told in the Jubilee booklet being printed in Uganda. We hope a few copies will be available for you to see. Today the school is thriving with over 330 girls and a big team of teachers, mostly

part-time, adequate facilities and a great Christian spirit. Our motto "Tuhwerane" (Let us help one another) chosen by the pioneer class in 1975 has shaped us as a learning community. Our results in public exams have been very good and more than 20 girls in Senior Six in each of the past few years have qualified for university education. In this country we have a team of Trustees of the U.K. Fund with an experienced Hon. Treasurer. This is the juncture for helping the school to manage its own finances and they have set up a charitable Foundation in Uganda to which gifts from outside may be sent in future. The U.K. Trust will continue to send out the money which we have in hand for our Assistance Fund and two Scholarships which have helped hundreds of girls over the years. We are so grateful for all the support given. When those funds are exhausted in about 5 years' time, the Trust will close down but no doubt Muyebe will still have a place in many hearts and continuing gifts to support the girls will flow there.

Now it is time to celebrate! On April 28th this year a special Foundation Day event is planned, drums will resound and there will be singing and energetic Kikiga dancing! It is hoped that the Minister of Education, Mrs Janet Museveni, and the Prime Minister, Robinah Nabbanja, two leading ladies in Uganda, will be in attendance. We can join in prayer thanking God for the past and laying the future before Him. The hymn "Lord for the years your love has kept and guided...we bring our thanks today" may be on our lips.


