The doors of Abbey Church have continued to be open most days and we have been pleased to welcome so many visitors both from the UK and from overseas. It is always encouraging to read the notes of appreciation which are entered into the Visitors' Book recognising that an open church offers a place for reflection and prayer. This became all the more significant following the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on 8 September 2022 and many of the entries after that sad event pay tribute to her long life of devotion, service, and faith as well as offering prayers for King Charles III and the responsibilities which he has now assumed. Our thoughts and prayers are with him and other members of the Royal Family at this time of loss and new beginnings.

This year's Harvest Thanksgiving service will be celebrated on Sunday 2 October. The service will be preceded by a Harvest Supper in our hall the previous evening. For many years, we have adopted a charity to support with our harvest offerings. We have sent cows to Africa, supported water and sanitation projects, and assisted with a bee keeping project in Uganda. It has been some time since we raised harvest funds to support our twinned congregation in Kalimpong, India. This year, our harvest offerings will be used to provide families in that area with fruit plants to enable them to grow fruit either for their own use or for sale (which would give them much-needed income).

Autumn traditionally sees the start of a new session in the life of our church organisations. WALT (the monthly bible study for women) started in early September and will continue to meet on the first Monday of the coming months. TAG (Tuesday Afternoon Group - affiliated to the Church of Scotland Guild) recommenced on 27 September and usually meets every fortnight. Both groups are well attended and are always pleased to welcome new members.

Our Little Nippers groups for pre-school children and their parents/carers recommenced in late-August when the new school term started. We were sad to say farewell to Kathryn Robertson who has been leader of this group since early 2020. Kathryn has led and developed this group during her time with us and we wish her well as she takes up new employment nearer her home in Dunbar. We hope to appoint a new leader shortly and, in the meantime, volunteers will lead the group. The session on 29 September will include a short Pram Service on the theme of harvest.



After a short break in the summer, our monthly Muddy Church restarted in late August with a wellattended gathering on the west beach.

In addition to the recommencement of our church organisations, we have also seen the start of new sessions for many organisations who use our buildings. There are very few days when our facilities are not in use, and it is good to report that such good use is being made of the facilities.

At the Kirk Session meeting on 15 August 2022, tribute was paid to our late elder Sarah Kerr and another longstanding and faithful member, Brian Maguire, both of whom are sorely missed in the life and work of Abbey Church. We considered reports from the Presbytery of Lothian meetings and from each of our Committees (Resources, Worship, World Church, Nurture and Outreach).

The Abbey Kirk Session meets again on 3 October 2022 and a report from that meeting will appear in the next Newsletter.

Dirleton Kirk Session Keith Stewart



It was a great honour and privilege for me to attend the State Funeral of Her Majesty the Queen. I thought of myself as representing Dirleton and Abbey at what was the largest event in the history of broadcast media, which was watched by an astonishing four billion people.

I was advised to travel to London on Saturday 17th, in order to avoid congestion on the public transport networks arising out of the funeral, and on Sunday afternoon I walked into Westminster to watch preparations being carried out. I saw the queue of people to pay their last respects in Westminster Hall, as it snaked around the South Bank of the Thames, over Lambeth Bridge, through Victoria Park and into the Houses of Parliament; huge crowds on Parliament Square and up and down Whitehall, policed by officers drawn from all over the country; and the flags of the world's countries flying behind Horse Guards Parade.

On the day of the funeral, I was in the Abbey by 9am, and so I missed seeing at first hand the extraordinarily moving scenes of the procession bringing the coffin. Nor could I see the members of the Royal Family as they took their places, though from my position in the North Transept I was able to see the coffin, draped in the vividly coloured standard, itself bearing the glittering Crown, orb and sceptre. But the Crowned heads entered from the same door and walked past, and I had a good view of the pulpit, and hence the Archbishop of Canterbury when he preached the funeral sermon; while the magnificent music, the spectacle, and the surroundings, were all alike inspiring.

The sermon, the prayers, and the readings; the music, and the hymns, all laid a huge emphasis on resurrection; that we will meet again, as the Archbishop preached, quoting Her Majesty, herself quoting the words of the song by Dame Vera Lynn; that Death is swallowed up in victory. There was space for sadness at the passing of a beloved Sovereign- but in the forefront was the Christian virtue of hope.

It was also heartening to see the participation in the ceremony of all the main Christian denominations, and the presence, united in honouring the Queen, of representatives of other Faiths.

Some of the aspects of the occasion which will have been less remarked upon: the wonderful strangeness of the sound of pipe music, such as we heard inside the Abbey as the procession approached; and the sonorous boom of the bell tolling ninety six times, once for each year of the late Queen's life. Later in the afternoon, the Westminster Abbey Company of Ringers were to ring the bells, fully muffled, in a peal of Stedman Caters, comprising 5,096 changes: I regret that I was not present to hear it, because such a peal is a magnificent sound indeed.

These notes are compiled ahead of the next meeting of the Dirleton Kirk Session, and I will not touch on the matters to be discussed: except to reiterate that, whatever gossip or speculation may be in circulation, there are no plans in any quarter to sell the Church Hall; and that, on the contrary, we have received confirmation from Presbytery that it is not to be sold.

My thanks to all involved in the replacement of the projector screen in the church.




WALT - Women Are Learning Together


