ABBEY CHURCH KIRK SESSION ROBERT BURGON

At the meeting of the Abbey Kirk Session held on 9 August 2021, tribute was paid to the late David McAdam who had been a dedicated elder over many years, even during the time since he suffered a major stroke about 2 years ago. Our prayers were extended to David's widow, Valerie, and his two daughters. We also prayed for the Torrance family, following the sudden passing of our elder Rev David Torrance's grandson, Daniel.

Further discussion took place about the disappointing and concerning proposals which had been presented by the Presbytery of Lothian concerning our future. The Kirk Session confirmed that it did not find the proposals either equitable or acceptable. A small group was established to develop our formal response to the proposals in conjunction with the Kirk Session of Dirleton Kirk. Our response was submitted to the Convenor of the Presbytery's Strategic Planning Mission Committee on 10 September 2021. In that response we have raised a number of questions about the proposals and the process which was adopted. We have been assured that we will receive responses to these questions, and we have been offered a meeting with representatives of Presbytery which will probably take place in October. We will update the congregation with news of progress.

As anticipated in the last Newsletter, the 2-metre distancing requirement in churches was reduced to 1-metre which allowed us to reconfigure the seating in church and increase our maximum capacity. Although the 1-metre rule has subsequently been removed, we have decided to maintain it meantime as a way of providing additional safety to those worshipping with us while levels of Covid 19 infection continue to be high. We are still required, by law, to wear face coverings during services. We have not yet reached our maximum capacity under the 1-metre arrangements and look forward to welcoming even more of our congregation at services in the coming weeks.

Congregational life now is much more like it was prepandemic with many of our groups either having resumed or about to do so. Little Nippers on a Thursday morning continues to be popular with pre-school children and their parents/ carers. Super Sunday Club is now meeting on a twice-monthly basis. Our new Tuesday Afternoon Group (TAG), which was formerly known as The Guild, will hold its first meeting on Tuesday 28 September and the women's study group, WALT, will recommence on a monthly basis on Monday 4 October. All these gatherings will continue to observe best practice in relation to Coronavirus in order to keep participants safe.

Our Harvest Thanksgiving Appeal this year is to support a project in Western Uganda where the charity, Bees Abroad is working with a small community providing training and equipment to enable them to keep bees. The sales of honey from this project enables the villagers to improve their income and their lifestyles. We will report the results of this appeal in our next Newsletter. We will again support the Blythswood Trust's Shoebox appeal this year enabling them to send gifts to people in several Eastern European countries, bringing joy at Christmas. Abbey Church will participate in the Church of Scotland's National Giving Day over the weekend of 16/17 October and further details are contained elsewhere in this Newsletter.

The next meeting of the Abbey Kirk Session will take place on 4 October 2021.

BLYTHSWOOD SHOEBOX APPEAL.

Jungle Adventure Holiday Club



The North Berwick Churches Holiday Club team had a busy summer!

We also put together a video for each week with story telling and applications. The response from families was very positive and it was great for the team to chat with families at their doors.

During the week of 26th July, we ran a holiday club in person for primary aged children based in the Lodge Gardens, and youth nights based at St Andrew Blackadder Church but out and about round the town too. We had a great week - 26 children came to our morning holiday club and 14 teenagers came to our youth nights over the week. We are so thankful for your prayers. We had a relatively dry week, with lots of fun and sharing about Jesus. Please give thanks for:

The Draft Presbytery Plan

In the August/September newsletter we were given an outline of the recent Presbytery Plan by our Minister and both he and the Session Clerks of Abbey and Dirleton strongly expressed their concerns about much of the proposal. I believe that an appropriate response has been sent by them to the Presbytery.

I first heard of the 'Plan' when I read the letter to the St Andrew Blackadder congregation which stated that there would be massive cuts to Abbey,Dirleton, Gullane and Aberlady churches.

I decided not to follow my initial negative reaction but to write in the first instance to the Presbytery suggesting that they find a more equitable solution, pointing out that the 75% cut in ordained minister for the four churches was not the approximate 25% cut agreed at the General Assembly. Facts from the 2020 -21 year book showed membership numbers and payment details to Church of Scotland Head office from each church. Eg Abbey/Dirleton gave £95,909. The combined four churches totalled £162,037. St Andrew Blackadder gave £101,288. In addition Abbey/Dirleton employ a Pastoral Assistant, a Young People's Worker who leads Youth Work on an ecumenical basis, thus benefiting other Christian churches in North Berwick, and a little Nipper Coordinator.

In response to 'proposed' property disposal I said that in the rapidly expanding town of North Berwick many new residents are retired and some will be changing church and able to devote more time to worship and enjoying the fellowship of like minded people and as the only way into the St. Andrew Blackadder sanctuary is up numerous stairs it is not suitable for many. One small individual lift is insufficient. Abbey has easy access down the side of the church for those who can't manage the couple of steps at the front door. If Abbey goes many elderly and/or physically challenged people who wish to worship in North Berwick will also go. Dirleton Church Hall being sold is ludicrous as it is used every day of the week by Church and community groups. There would be no place for fellowship and coffee after church, nowhere for Sunday School children to go after the children's address and extra expense would be incurred heating the church for midweek prayers etc.

I suggested a fairer allocation of ministers which would not be so drastic could be the linking of Abbey/ Dirleton/Gullane with Aberlady either joining St AB or Longniddry. 2 Ordained ministers and possibly 0.5 OLM/Lay would be approximately 25% cut. Only when an equitable conclusion has been agreed should the disposal of one or more manses be considered, taking into account which are most fit for purpose.

In conversation with members of other churches I became aware that we could help each other by sharing examples of 'best practice'. I gave some examples.

I explained that I was writing to the Presbytery to give the viewpoint of a 'getting on a bit North Berwick incomer' who joined Abbey about 9 years ago. I gradually became aware that I was part of the 'church family'. I gave some examples of kindnesses shown to me by the church and explained that this in turn encouraged me to become involved in church life and outlined some examples of things I've found myself doing eg everything from editing the newsletter for a spell to operating puppets at Law Primary.

I said I'd enjoyed regular Bible study provided by Abbey, including WALT and that I was looking forward to resumption (post Covid) of such activities as Regal, outdoor Easter worship. During lockdown Abbey made every effort to continue to preach and teach the Christian message by online services, Bible study and zoom prayer meetings. I wondered how many churches had online New Testament Greek lessons. (Abbey did).

I pointed out that the pre Covid average church attendance was far above the C of S average and said that if there are two vibrant churches in North Berwick we should be thankful and bring about change by including the other churches mention, perhaps in one of the ways I had suggested.

I know that some others have made their views known to the Presbytery and I would encourage any of you who are hesitant to do so. The more constructive comments that they receive the better.

Comments – Abbey Church (All Funds) – Quarter to 30th June 2021

General

Payments exceeded receipts by £1,747. This is much better than budget, the budget was set to allow for the employment of a youth worker.

Income

The congregation has been very generous and income from Standing Orders remains much higher than in previous years.

(Note - If you are a tax payer and wish the Abbey to recover the tax paid by yourself please would you ask for a gift-aid form by phoning the office or ask Phil for one. Alternatively, both the gift-aid and the standing order form are available from the Abbey Church website).

The Halls are coming back into use by our regular users following the easing of the Covid 19 restrictions.

Expenditure

The Church of Scotland has substantially reduced the amount payable to them for 2021, these amounts cover the costs of running the Church of Scotland including Ministers' salaries, this payment is called Ministry and Mission. The Abbey continued to claim furlough income on some staff. The staff, however, are being paid their full salary.

Much of the expenditure is less than budget due to the very much reduced use of the Church building.

Abbey Church National Giving Day 2021

The Church of Scotland has initiated a National Giving Day this year, as a response to the pandemic and the financial losses that congregations have had to bear during the last 18 months.

The Abbey congregation has responded so generously during this time, with increases in the number of people giving by Standing Order and the amounts they have given. We are very grateful for these offerings towards the work of the church here and nationally. However, we have had a major reduction in the income from hall hire while groups were not allowed to meet together and a loss in offerings from visitors. We are grateful that the situation now allows groups to come back to using our halls, but in the meantime we have had to again draw on our reserves to meet ongoing costs, resulting in an overall deficit for the last few years. We continue to use our reserves, particularly to fund our outreach work, in the form of our Young People's Worker and Little Nippers Coordinator.

The offerings received for National Giving Day will go specifically to Abbey Church. They will not form part of the income which is used to calculate our Ministries and Mission contribution for the following year. We plan to mark National Giving Day in Abbey Church over the weekend of 16/17 October and further details will be given in our weekly intimations

If you would like to make an extra gift towards Abbey Church on National Giving Day, we invite you to give through bank transfer, cheque or cash, as outlined on the form. If you are a taxpayer, please confirm by completing and signing the form. An envelope is provided for your convenience.




